- Robin: Welcome to Here to Judge where we scour the internet to dissect dilemmas and decide who's to blame. Here to Judge today is me, Robin Morgan.
- Priya: Me, Priya Hall.
- Mali: And me, Mali Ann Rees.
- Priya: 'Am I the asshole for storming out of a dinner with my wife and her best friend? I went out to eat with my wife and her best friend. I don't like her friend because I think she's a very selfish, self-centred, loud, and irritating person to be around. And her friend knows that I hold that opinion about her. - Robin: Nice.

- Mali: Was it? Was it?
- Robin: Who were like the big dubstep artists of your youth?
- Mali: What was that one? The mouse one.
- Robin: Deadmau5.
- Mali: That's the one.
- Priya: I'm not sure you were a fan.
- Mali: I was. I was.
- Robin: [Laughs]
- Mali: I just haven't listened to dubstep since I was you know 17, so it's been a long time. But you know I still like, like Magnetic Man. Yeah I can't remember any of the others. Please believe me that I'm not lying, I swear.
- Priya: [Laughs] I'm fairly sure if this camera panned to the other wall in your bedroom it will be all posters from Kerrang! and you're just lying to us.

- Mali: Yeah.
- Robin: [Laughs] I really enjoyed, slightly going back to the story.
- Priya: Rude.
- Robin: Soz. Where she's saying that the baby kicks when she looks at the posters, which suggests like they're rockin' the bands, you know they're really enjoying the music.
- Mali: Exactly.
- Priya: Or that the baby is the asshole.
- Mali: Oh.
- Robin: Oh what a...

- Mali: ...just like getting really angry.
- Priya: [Laughs]
- Mali: Lazily floating, like it's hilarious.

- Priya: [Laughs]
- Robin: Yeah Jake's the asshole in this I think. - Priya: Yeah that shouldn't be on the tip of your tongue.

- Robin: Yeah!
- Mali: I don't say 'fucking bitch' very often.

- Robin: Hey this could be your thing for the new year. I'm fascinated by what the secret is.
- Mali: Mm.
- Robin: Because it's got to be big isn't it? It's got to be big.
- Priya: The fact that there's no more mention of the secret in the post shows that OP is remarkably in control of himself. Because my immediate response would be to try and find out that secret. I'd be on the phone to Sally immediately.
- Robin: Yeah definitely. But like it's got to be something genuinely huge like 'I buried a body underneath this river. Shhh! Don't tell anyone'.
