Rachel: No OK sorry. It's always good to try ideas and then

fucking slate them.

Cathy: No it's really not.

Rachel: I have no problem with that. It's all about letting go,

Cathy: Your workshopping is horrific.

Rachel: I know it's awful.

Cathy: I know.

Rachel: But you've got to try.

Cathy: Why at the end of every sentence do I go like that?

Rachel: Yeah right.

Cathy: Rach you're really fucking narky.

Rachel: I'm irritabated, irritabated with you [chuckles] I'm

irritabated.

Cathy: Yeah go on.

Rachel: Welcome to I Wish I Was An Only Child, where we Cath...

Cathy: That's me.

Rachel: And me, Rachel Mason, speak to other siblings about the

dynamic of their relationship so we can see where we're

going wrong.

Cathy: This week we spoke to Nicola and Rosie Dempsey.

Rachel: Better known as musical comedy duo Flo & Joan. Cath

obviously kept trying to ally with one of them...

Cathy: [Laughs]

Rachel: ...which is her way. So every time we speak to someone

Cath says 'Yes you are me, you are me'.

Cathy: No.

Rachel: But I know I felt we were a fair mix. When you were

saying about getting men, you said...

Cathy: I'd never say that. 'Getting men'?

Rachel: Uh I think it was...

Cathy: [Laughs] Sorry, when you were talking about getting

men. But why at the end of every time I say anything, I go

like that [laughs].

Rachel: All right.

Rachel: Who's the funniest?

Nicola: Oh!

Rosie: You make me laugh the most. You're like on paper you're

the funniest.

Nicola: I'm the driest but when the ideas I pitch are the most

unfunniest. Rosie is more fun than I am, and I'm like more

dry funny.

I'm funner yeah. You're cleverer, you write jokes. I can't Rosie:

> sit and write a joke, I don't know how to do it but I can be like, 'Oh on stage if we say it like this, it will be funny'.

Nicola: Mm-hmm.

Rachel: So you complement each other perfectly is what you're

saying?

Rosie: I think so it's embarrassing to say it but I think that's sort

of what happens.

Rachel: Yeah and I bet you don't say it to each other.

Rosie: No.

Nicola: No.

Rachel: Because we certainly never complement each other. No.

Cathy: [Laughs]

Nicola: No way.

Cathy: I'm definitely the funniest.

Rachel: Definitely yeah. And I'm definitely the most irritated.

[Laughs] Nicola:

Rachel: So that's really interesting because you just immediately

both said...

Nicola: The other.

Rachel: Yeah. Or you're just very polite.

I mean I don't think we're particularly, we're not polite Nicola:

about each other I don't think.

No we'll definitely tell each other when they're not funny. Rosie:

And I think that's probably why we know our strengths Nicola:

> and weaknesses it's because we're both like, this thing needs to happen now. I'll take it and I'll be like 'I'll write

that' and then we just sort of know who is better at what really.

Rosie: Yeah.

Cathy: But do you ever just sit down and cry laughing? And I'm

not talking about work, just throughout your life, do you

just get stuff that nobody else gets between you?

Nicola: Oh 100%.

Rosie: Yeah.

Nicola: And then we try and turn it into a song or whatever and

then an audience thinks, you're absolutely out of your fucking mind. They then don't laugh and it either makes you laugh more because you're like, oh this is really embarrassing that we find this, we'll like try new material in front of like our housemates or whatever just to try and like try and get a gauge on if it's OK. And we'll be like crying not being able to get through a song. And they're

like 'Cool do you want a tea?'

Rosie: [Laughs]

Nicola: And we'll just leave, like it's really excruciating.

Cathy: Yeah?

Nicola: Yeah.

Cathy: But how did that work when you were younger? Did you

make each other laugh a lot when you were younger or

did you hate each other like we did?

Rosie: I've tried to think about this a lot and there were

definitely moments when I have hated you so much.

Nicola: Mm-hmm.

Rosie: Like wanted to destroy you.

Nicola: Mm-hmm.

Rosie: But I think a lot of our laughter came from making fun of

our mum [laughs]. I think at the dinner table probably

making fun of her.

Nicola: Yeah.

Rosie: When we were teenagers...

Nicola: I think we were just like pretty indifferent to each other.

Rosie: Yeah.

Rachel: What's the age difference?

Nicola: Just two years so it's not very much.

Rosie: Yeah.

Nicola: We're just really different so we didn't really cross paths.

Rosie: I feel like we'd make each other laugh though.

Nicola: Yeah but it wouldn't be, we weren't best friends and we

weren't like, it wasn't intentional I think.

Rosie: I don't know if I ever found you funny actually.

Nicola: Thanks. [Laughs]

Rachel: So were you at different schools? Did you have different

friends?

Nicola: Well we were at the same school, but definitely different

friends.

Rosie: We might have like a little crossover? Actually no, we had

no crossover.

Nicola: No.

Rosie: No.

Nicola: Rosie was very cool and so I was like incredibly intimated

by all her friends.

Cathy: Oh you are so me!

Nicola: [Laughs]

Cathy: Absolutely amazing.

Nicola: And that goes through to like all of your university friends

as well.

Rosie: Yeah.

Nicola: They're all like really, really nice people but just really

cool and so I just didn't ever dare go anywhere near

them.

Cathy: And did more people fancy her? Like we have that

situation, yeah?

Nicola: Oh, I think so.

Rosie: I don't know though because I think I was sort of like the

weird one of the cool group. So I was never like the fancy person. I was always the one that the boyfriends would come and have a laugh with when they got bored of their boring girlfriends. Because I didn't really date anyone at

school.

Nicola: No.

Rosie: Yeah, I mean we probably both had similar success or

failure in that.

Nicola: Yeah. We were never the hot girl on campus.

Rosie: Never the Olson twins on campus you know?

Nicola: No [laughs].

Cathy: Rachel was, I wasn't.

Rachel: No, no, no.

Cathy: So describe each other, describe each other.

Rachel: In a nutshell.

Rosie: Right like as now or?

Rachel: Now.

Rosie: Now. Um bookish, smart, dry, funny.

Rachel: Nice, lovely, lovely. Nicola can you describe Rosie in a

nutshell?

Nicola: Fun, sociable, like very personable and...

Rosie: Do a bad one.

Nicola: What so that you feel better about calling me basically a

nerd?

Rosie: I said 'bookish' bookish is a lovely way to describe a nerd I

feel.

Nicola: [Laughs]

Rosie: And you are bookish.

Nicola: OK. Sociable, fun, um? Funny. Um? And...

Rosie: [Laughs]

Nicola: Can I just say three?

Rachel: Yeah.

Nicola: I feel we don't have to do a word for a word.

Cathy: Is there anything that you're covering up? Are either of

you being nice or do you think you could say something

horrible to the other person?

Nicola: We like argue, oh and stubborn, but we're both really

stubborn.

Rosie: Oh yeah we're both stubborn yeah.

Nicola: So I think that's probably the thing we hate the most in

each other. And we like really hate that in each other, but

we also have it so you're like great.

Cathy: So how does that work?

Rachel: Yeah.

Cathy: How do you get anything done?

Rosie: You choose the hills that you're willing to die on. A lot of

it is like, 'I don't want to argue about that anymore, you

win that one, let's move on'.

Nicola: And then you pocket it for an I told you so moment later

on down the line.

Rosie: [Laughs] Yeah.

Nicola: You store it. I'm sure both of us have got a nice little bank

of like, I fucking told you that wasn't going to work. Or I

knew this was going to happen.

Rosie: Yeah.

Cathy: So neither of you is in charge and in control of everything

and basically gets their own way the whole time?

Nicola: No.

Rosie: Not really.

Nicola: I wouldn't say so.

Rachel: I love how you simplify it because that's basically how it

works with us.

All: [Laughs]

Nicola: Who's the bitch?

Rosie: Who is in charge with you two?

Nicola: Yeah.

Cathy: Well who do you think?

Rachel: Definitely. See how the next few minutes unfold. So you

were indifferent, the word you used was indifferent to each other growing up. So when did you come back together? Because obviously music is a theme for you but how did you get closer, come back together and end up working together?

Nicola:

I think when we went away to uni, because you went to London and I went to Cardiff. And I think then you sort of realise like oh we're quite, we don't love each other. Like we sort of say it in shows 'We're not best friends' and we do mean like we're not best friends, like it's not a bit. But I think you move away and then you're like, I sort of miss that person that I lived with for 18 years or whatever. So I think we sort of got a little bit closer then. And we both like the theatre and musicals and stuff so we'd do those things together in a way that our friends probably didn't like it as much as we did so that was a nice bonding thing.

Rosie:

Yeah or like weird TV stuff or weird shows and stuff that I hadn't found the friends at uni yet who I could share that stuff with but I'm like, I know Nicola will love this.

Nicola: Mm.

Rosie:

And then you sort of miss that reference point person a little bit. Our tastes were always quite similar. We were watching the same comedy and wanting to see the same stuff and listening to similar music so that you were like the person who you could share those fun bits with but you hadn't found anyone else to do with yet at uni.

Nicola:

Yeah and then I moved to Toronto and Rosie came out to join me, and we just ended up living together because we didn't know anyone else, so we were like well it makes sense to just live together. And that was sort of when we started working together as well.

Cathy: Hang on, Rosie why did you follow her?

Nicola: Yeah good question.

Cathy: I mean seriously. That's quite a long follow yeah.

Rosie: Yeah that is a long follow.

Nicola: That's not just, you were the same top as me. That's why

are you living in the same country as me?

Rosie: Yeah I left uni and I didn't know what to do so I just

worked for a year, and then earned money in a pub. And I was supposed to go travelling with friends, but that fell through. So I had like an itch where I wanted to not be in England. And Nicola was doing courses with the Second

City. Do you know the Second City?

Rachel: Yeah.

I've literally got nothing to come home for, I'll stay. I

stayed in an Airbnb for a month I think?

Cathy: But you weren't going to be with Nicola were you? You

were doing it for your own thing? Because I would just

follow Rach basically.

Rachel: Yeah [laughs].

Cathy: And Nicola, were you pissed off? Was it irritating that she

was there? Or were you pleased or?

Rachel: Have you ever talked about this?

Nicola: I think we have. I think Rosie is a better actor than I am.

I'm not an actor. I went to learn how to write, I wanted to be a TV writer. So I went and did like improv and stuff and was like, oh I know this is not where my skills lie. Like I enjoyed it but I wasn't going to be a professional at it. But I knew that Rosie would enjoy it because she's funny and she's a good actor. So it was just one of those. And I just really enjoyed it and was like 'You'll have a fucking great time. And your other option is to go to Thailand

with your friends which is like'.

Rosie: I'm glad I didn't do that.

Nicola: Yeah. So at that point you're like well if you're not going

to stay then like do it and it will be fun and then see you later. So I wasn't like, I was never angry at it. There's always that little bit where you're like, oh she's better than me, oh she's a lot better than me at improv. At

improv you were.

Rosie: Oh yeah at improv but I couldn't write a sketch.

Nicola: And also I'm like self-aware enough to know that, it was

not like this was my thing, like I'm not an idiot, I know I'm not a good actor, so I can't be annoyed at someone who

is better at acting than me.

Cathy: Neither of you are dependent on each other are you?

That's what it sounds like, you're both quite self-

contained.

Rosie: Yeah I would say.

Nicola: I think so. We're definitely like separate enough.

Rachel: But you sort of are dependent on each other now

because you've got this.

Nicola: 100%.

Rosie: We're contractually obliged to be dependent on each

other.

Nicola: Yeah [laughs].

Rachel: Exactly. And how does that feel in terms of being a

double act? Do you ever worry that the other one might

decide that they don't want to do it anymore?

Rosie: I have thought about this because...

Nicola: Wait what?

Rosie: [Laughs] I was like, if we stopped doing this, you'd just go

and be a comedy writer because that's what you're good

at.

Nicola: And you'd be an actor.

Rosie: I'd probably try and do, I think I'd struggle a lot more

because it's a lot more difficult and I don't quite have enough of the skills to back me up yet. But also, this is a cheesy thing to say but I love everything that she writes, so I would be excited that you're doing something that I

can also enjoy at the same time.

Nicola: Mm yeah.

Rachel: And also she could write the sitcom that you could star

in.

Rosie: Yeah.

Rachel: So it could be perfect.

Rosie: Yeah let's get that in writing and let's get on with it.

Nicola: [Laughs]

Rachel: But what happens if you've got a gig or whatever and you

have a massive row? You're saying you're both really stubborn, have you had situations, you must have had

situations where you...

Cathy: The reason we're doing this podcast is so many people

said to us 'How can you work with your sister?'

Rachel: Yeah.

Cathy: People would either say 'Oh my God, it's the best thing

ever'. And I'm sure you get this. Or 'I would rather die

than work with my sibling'.

Rosie: Yeah.

Nicola: Yeah, I get that more than anything.

Cathy: Yeah so...

Rachel: And we're just fascinated because our relationship is

really intense.

Cathy: It's so fucked up. It's fucked.

Rachel: It's dysfunctional. It's intense. We're finding this out more

and more.

Cathy: Yeah.

Rachel: And so it's really interesting talking to all these you know

different siblings.

Cathy: We keep coming across people that just get on and it's all

fine, and I can't cope with it.

Rosie: We definitely don't. Not all the time.

Cathy: But do you find that you have like shorthand with each

other and you can tell each other to like 'fuck off'.

Rosie: Yeah.

Nicola: Totally, totally.

Rachel: Yeah. But it's usually 'We've got a meeting' and Cath's

like 'We're not doing it'. [Laughs] So I'm like 'We've got a meeting in like an hour' 'Well I'm not fucking doing it' because you know we have this constant, yeah, no

exactly that will be edited out.

Nicola: [Laughs]

Rosie: But then it gets shit done as well though and you can be

like 'Don't want do it, do want to do it' and you don't have to worry about having to find another person that

you would do the business with or whatever.

Rachel: Yeah.

Rosie: You're always going to be sisters. The worst case scenario

is you don't talk to each other ever again but.

Cathy: So why don't you just walk away and see? I don't know if

you're in relationships, if you are, would you slag the hell

off out of the other person to your other half?

Rachel: Why would you ask that?

Cathy: Because I do.

Rachel: I know. I know.

Rosie: [Laughs]

Nicola: Recently we were having a discussion about something

and it was during lockdown and we don't live together. So it was from two separate places. And it was the first time I slammed the laptop in the middle of a conversation and was just like 'Fuck you' and slammed it.

And then afterwards, I'm stubborn and I was like well obviously it was her fucking fault and I'm not fixing this.

Rosie: It wasn't my fault.

Nicola: It was.

Rachel: And then what happened? How did it resolve?

Nicola: I think we usually just send a text and be like 'I'm sorry,

would want to hang out with.

Nicola: Oh yeah I don't mean like let's keep people under lock

and key, like we're on dating apps or whatever but you

wouldn't really talk about it that much.

Cathy: So if you met someone you would not phone the other

up and go 'I met' you just wouldn't do that?

Rosie: We would. I'd be like 'I went on a date with someone, I

really liked them, I want to go on a date again.' And I'd be like, 'Sorry Nicola I can't write a song today, I'm going to

Alton Towers with John'.

All: [Laughs]

Nicola: Alton Towers, classy.

Rosie: But also when I'm dating people are always like 'Oh do

you go for someone who likes what you do? Or likes comedy?' And part of me is like, I want to be with someone who doesn't have to see me live and still gets on with me. Because I want to be able to come home

after a gig and chat with someone maybe not about the gig, about something else. Like to sort of keep, like if I

date a comedian then you only talk about comedy. How horrible is that?

Cathy: Never date a comedian.

Rosie: Oh God no, don't worry.

Nicola: You couldn't pay me enough money.

Rosie: Yeah.

Nicola: Not that the offers are flooding it at all. They're really

not. But.

Rosie: Red tape.

Rachel: But you're basically saying you've got to have enough

areas of your life that are separate?

Rosie: Yeah.

Nicola: I think so, just so much of it is.

Rachel: Because I feel like that. I feel like we're in this rattled old

marriage.

Rosie: Yeah [laughs]

Cathy: That's what it feels like.

Rachel: And it's that thing where you go, I am married and Cath

does have a relationship and we each have a son but.

Cathy: I know it's miraculous.

Rosie: [Laughs]

Rachel: I know it's amazing she's let me as well. But I feel like

that, you have to go away, you have to have some space to go out you know. Because we've got lots of mutual friends, obviously we're in the same business, so similar to you yeah. But you've got separate, whereas we have

lots of mutual friends.

Cathy: Yeah definitely.

Rachel: We don't have lots of separation.

Rosie: Do you hang out together with your partners?

Cathy: Yes all the time, we go on holidays together.

Rachel: We go on holidays, yeah.

Rosie: Oh nice.

Cathy: Rachel is about to leave London and I'm so furious about

it.

Rachel: Yeah. She wouldn't speak to me for a few day when I said

that so.

Cathy: Yeah. It's the only reason I'm doing this podcast is to try

and get her...

All: [Laughter]

Rachel: Even though you can do it remotely, you can do it from

anywhere. But Cath was still like, well fuck that I'm pissed

off. So yeah.

Cathy: Yeah. So is there any traits that you envy in the other?

Something you wish you had?

Rosie: You're naturally more clever I think.

Nicola: Mm.

Rosie: I was more, I'd read the textbook and I'd study loads

before the exam, and like check off everything that I had to know. But you could probably not listen in class and then go to the exam and still know the answers I reckon.

Nicola: Mm? I don't know.

Rosie: No she disagrees?

Nicola: Well I thought that was the case and then I sat my A-

levels and fucked them based on that like, oh I'll be fine.

Rachel: Oh no.

Nicola: So like yeah. I don't know.

Rosie: What do you envy about me?

Nicola: Um? Oh you're very sociable.

Rosie: OK.

Nicola: She's like very personable and sociable and easy to talk

to. And I think I'm quite standoffish and people, you can't hide it, people know that I look difficult to talk to because I am difficult to talk to like. I think I wear it quite obviously. Even if you've never met us, you could watch a show and be like, one of them is bubbly and one of them is not. And you'd be like, oh well glasses. So I think yeah I'd like to be more sociable. And you have more time for people in that same way where I'm like, 'I don't like

anyone here, I'm not going to stay'.

Rosie: But you are very loyal though.

Nicola: I'm really loyal to the people that I love but if I like go to a

party and there's no one there that I like, I will just leave.

Rachel: Rosie would you leave a party?

Cathy: No she's never going to leave a party.

Rachel: You're never going to leave a party obviously.

Rosie: I actually, I physically don't know how to leave a party.

Cathy: [Laughs]

Rosie: I can't go to bed until I know that everyone has left. I

have to be the last.

Rachel: Oh!

Rosie: I'm really, really bad for 'last orders'. They call last orders

at the bar, I'm literally sucking the taps until the whole

place is out.

Cathy: Not now I hope.

Rosie: Uh no, not now no. Well I'm sanitising the taps and then

sucking them.

Cathy: Exactly.

Rachel: So who is the most competitive?

Rosie: Me.

Nicola: Rosie. Rosie once, we were playing a came of Frustration

and she flipped the board and told our stepdad to go fuck

himself.

Rosie: [Laughs] No, I don't think it was Terry.

Nicola: It was Terry.

Rosie: Someone cheated and then, if anyone is going to cheat

it's only going to be me. Don't you dare cheat on the game that I'm about to cheat on, do you know what I

mean?

Rachel: Yes. And Nicola you're just much more laidback?

Nicola: I'm still competitive but Rosie is more competitive.

Rosie: If we were playing a quiz, you'd be quietly competitive.

Nicola: Mm hmm.

Cathy: Right.

Nicola: I'm annoyed when I've lost but I don't try and sabotage

other people to win.

Rosie: [Laughs]

Nicola: I'm more angry that my own ability hasn't allowed me to

win something but I feel like you get more angry that

someone else is beating you.

Rosie: Yeah.

Cathy: Do you ever lie? Do you ever lie to each other?

Nicola: Probably.

Rosie: Maybe tell a white lie but.

Nicola: Yeah nothing massive.

Cathy: Oh vou backed off there. 'Yeah we do lie. Oh no we

don't'.

Wait no we don't [laughs] I've definitely lied to you but Nicola:

nothing like huge.

I would be something like 'I've been looking at the show Rosie:

all day' you hadn't been.

Nicola: Yeah.

Like if we're writing something. Rosie:

Nicola: The Google doc says it hasn't been edited in 36 hours.

Yeah [laughs] Or like, I've been thinking about this idea, Rosie:

uh literally five minutes before this call, had a tiny little

write down of some notes.

Nicola: Yeah.

Cathy: So there's nothing you want to come clean with the other

now?

Rosie: Not really, no.

I don't think there's anything exciting enough that even if Nicola:

I did it would be like 'Oh I've still got your jumper that I

nicked a couple of years ago'. But I don't even have that.

Yeah. In the job that we do there's not really much to lie Rosie:

> about because we see every email. We do everything together. We're at every gig together. There's not a lot of margin for a lie. Because we're all eyes on everything together at the same time so. So in our career that's the

> case. But in general, in childhood times there's probably a

million things I've lied to you about but I don't remember

them.

Rachel: Who is most like to fall over?

Nicola: Oh me. I'm not going to show you my knee. On Tuesday

night? No last Thursday, we were doing a gig and I skipped onto the stage and unstacked it immediately and I've got a massive egg on my right knee and then a huge

bruise on my left leg.

Cathy: Oh.

Nicola: I fall over all the time.

Rosie: Every time we do a gig that we're nervous I always

whisper in her ear just before we walk on saying 'I hope

you fall down the stairs'.

All: [Laughter]

Cathy: Aww.

Nicola: That's the only tradition I think we have. You say 'I hope

you fall down the stairs' and I say 'I hope you have the

worst show of your life'.

Rosie: Yeah.

Nicola: So we never hug.

Rosie: Hello everybody...

Cathy: Have you ever done a gig where you just go 'Fuck you, I'm

not going on'?

Nicola: We've had like small moments. Was it? We went to do a

song and you'd like left, like your egg shake or something offstage. So she had to leave the stage to go and get it and it was the scariest one minute of my life where I was like, I can't do this. I can't talk to people. I can't talk to people and she can't play the piano. So without the other one, it's really shit for the audience, like it's just terrible. So I don't think she did, thank fucking God I would have

left the stage.

Rosie: Yeah.

Rachel: Nicola, do you feel a responsibility being the older sister?

Do you feel a responsibility towards Rosie? Because I've never asked you that, whether you feel a responsibility

towards me?

Cathy: Oh I don't, but you feel a huge responsibility towards me.

Rachel: Yeah.

Rosie: Who is the older one out of you two?

Rachel: Cath.

Cathy: I'm the eldest, but mentally Rachel, actually me.

All: [Laughter]

Rachel: Yeah so. But I've never, ever asked that and never

thought about it. And I'm thinking with you two. So yeah, Nicola do you feel a responsibility towards Rosie because

you are the older sister?

Nicola: Um?

Rachel: How does that feel? I can't imagine.

Nicola: Not as the older sibling, but just as like as kids you're like

'Oh that's my little sister' but now if I feel a responsibility it's not because you're my younger sister I den't think

it's not because you're my younger sister I don't think.

Rosie: Mm.

Nicola: I think it's more of like, oh it looks like she's having a bad

day, are you sure this is OK? Or like we don't have to say yes to this, or we don't have to do that. But it's not because she's my younger sister, it's just like that's like more of a work thing than it is of like, oh I have to take care of you because is I don't mum is going to kick off

sort of thing.

Rosie: And we also never grew up, I don't think I ever went to

you for advice.

Nicola: No.

Rosie: There was never like the older sister helping the younger

sister out. Like not in a mean way but that...

Nicola: Wasn't a dynamic.

Rosie: I'd never go to Nicola and be like 'Oh I need your help

with this'.

Nicola: No one should ever come to me for advice ever but

[laughs].

Cathy: Why did you not go to her for advice? I'm surprised.

Rosie: I don't know. I think because I probably worked it out

already myself or been like 'I'll sort this out, I'll deal with it, I know what's the right thing to do kind of thing'. So I

never kind of needed you in that way.

Nicola: Mm.

Rosie: I think? Yeah I don't think I ever came to you.

Rachel: Who's most likely to complain to a waiter? I can't decide,

I'm trying to think if I could judge that.

Nicola: Yeah.

Rosie: No I never would complain to a waiter.

Nicola: Actually we'd probably both stick our heads in the sand.

Rosie: Yeah if the food is cold, I'll eat the cold food.

Nicola: Yeah.

Rosie: They'll walk away and I'll say 'For fuck sake it's cold' but

I'll eat it.

Nicola: We went out to dinner yesterday and they brought, I

think they were supposed to be pork dumplings. I'd

ordered pork dumplings...

Rosie: She loves a dumpling, that's one thing you should know

about.

Nicola: Fucking love dumplings. And she like put the plate down

and was like 'Chicken dumplings' and walked away. And

Rosie was like 'Won't those supposed to be pork?'

Rosie: [Laughs]

Nicola: I was like 'Yup'. And then ate them, like, chicken's fine.

Cathy: [Laughs] Whereas I'd get Rachel to complain and I would

never complain. But I would make Rachel do it.

Rachel: That's weird that neither of you complain though. You're

both the same on that.

Rosie: Yeah that's weird.

Nicola: We could be so much further in life if either of us had any

kind of faith in ourselves as human beings [laughs].

Rosie: Yeah, I hate confrontation.

Nicola: Yeah.

Rosie: We're both really bad with confrontation.

Nicola: Mm.

Rosie: Really bad. It makes me shiver thinking that I'll ever have

to confront someone.

Cathy: No you're good with it Rach.

Nicola: Even like when we're doing shows and stuff when people

like set something or like they'll do it wrong. And Rosie will be like 'Isn't that a bit too high? Isn't your piano too high? Or isn't that pedal in the wrong place?' Actually it's

when we drank too much at Melbourne Comedy Festival

and they'd wheeled the piano up. We'd done tech and everything had been like labelled and put in the right place. And then when it got to the actual show, the piano was like way off to one side, but we'd been told 'You've got this much time' and we knew that we were really up to it anyway. So rather than fuss about and move things to where they needed to be, I played the whole thing with the piano like way off to the left so I look like I'm fucking hula dancing all the way through.

All: [Laughter]

Nicola: Like, it just looks really odd when you're like, why is she

playing everything to the left? It just looked weird.

Rosie: Yeah.

Nicola: But at the time, I was like 'We'll disrupt the show. We

don't have enough time anyway, it's probably playable just work it out'. And now there's a video on the internet

we're like I just look like a fucking nutcase.

Rosie: It doesn't look that bad actually.

Nicola: It doesn't but when you look at it you're like, if you'd just

said something, you could have played that and looked like a normal human. And instead I was like 'I'll figure it

out' [laughs] Like OK great.

Rachel: And is that changing as time's gone?

Nicola: No.

Rachel: No.

Rosie: Sometimes her agent is like 'Just spend the time, when

you go out and if you're filming something if it goes wrong, you're allowed to stop and do it again'. We'd be like, no, no, no, get through the song, get through the song and run off the stage before anyone can like scream at you. I don't think it has got better. Maybe we take one

second extra to regain a breath.

Nicola: Mm.

Rosie: But no still, just scared to be alive actually is the headline

news there.

Nicola: [Laughs]

Cathy: Oh I know that one. Who is happier?

Nicola: Oh? I'll say that I'm not unhappy.

Rosie: I'm not unhappy.

Nicola: I think that's a good place to be as a human.

Rosie: Who's happier?

Cathy: Oh OK that's really balanced and good.

Rosie: Yeah. I probably smile more.

Rachel: We sound like therapists.

Nicola: You definitely smile more.

Rosie: But that doesn't necessarily mean I'm happy [laughs].

Nicola: [Laughs] That's true.

Rosie: Yeah, I'd say probably similar, we find our happiness in

different bits. I think?

Nicola: Yeah I think so. My mum used to think that I was a really

unhappy baby.

Rosie: Did she?

Nicola: Like as a kid, I don't know why. Like she dropped it in a

conversation a couple of years ago and was like 'Of course you were a very unhappy child' and I was like, I

thought I was pretty fucking happy actually.

Rosie: [Laughs]

Nicola: Like I don't have any complaints. But maybe I've just been

like wearing it on my face since I was like six, that I just

look unhappy all the time, but actually I'm having a lovely day.

Rachel: How is Christmas for you two? Give us a sense of your

Christmases.

Rosie: Christmas was, and still is the best day of the year. I

bloody love Christmas. That feeling has never gone away for me. Christmas day, it's never going anywhere I don't think. We'd come down, probably early in the morning. We'd always get stockings at the end of our bed. Mum would do stockings and put like little bits in them. Like a Gerri Halliwell CD, probably popping out of the top.

Cathy: Oh yeah.

Rosie: I have always had, and it's still a tradition, a bag of pick &

mix. I always get a bag of pick & mix in my stocking and

you'll always get white chocolate or something.

Nicola: Mm-hmm.

Rosie: Go downstairs. Oh, there was a period of time where we

always had to go to church.

Nicola: Mm.

Rosie: Ugh. And then, but don't have to do that anymore. As

adult women we can make our own choices about that.

Nicola: [Laughs]

Cathy: Can I ask, whose house you're in now?

Nicola: Rosie's.

Rosie: My one.

Cathy: OK interesting, Rachel will always have to come to me to

do anything. I've got a nicer house.

Rachel: Yeah she said 'I don't really like your house' so I said 'OK'

then that's why.

Nicola: That's sort of how we've always been.

Rosie: Yeah your flat last time wasn't very nice.

Nicola: I had a flat. Rosie was in a house and I was in a flat, which

was just like one room. So it was just impossible.

Rosie: There wasn't a lot of airflow coming through.

Nicola: It was just quite small. And then I've only just moved into

a new place and I don't really know my roommates so it

feels a bit weird to.

Cathy: You wouldn't live together? You don't want to live

together?

Nicola: No.

Rosie: We did it in Toronto.

Nicola: Yeah in Toronto we did it for like three years. And again

it's just like why? I think was so many like, people think that there are lots of, I think they see a sibling double act, especially musical comedians which is like embarrassing enough as it is. And then to like layer on, oh you're also siblings and you're adults, oh that's a shame. So like the more stereotypes that people probably think are true that you can go 'Actually no, we don't live together'. And yeah we just spend all day, every day doing work together. And we were just like, let's just have some

fucking space for a bit.

Rosie: Yeah.

Rachel: You've got to have something else to say to each other

right? That's my view.

Rosie: Yes.

Nicola: And just somewhere else, another house to storm off to.

Cathy: Is there anything that you've never said to the other, that

you want to say now?

Rosie: That is a good question. This is going to sound cheesy but

there are some times where I'm really grateful that you've done something, and I'll be like 'Thanks for doing it' and then I'll come home and I'll be like, I hope she

knows that I was really thankful that she did that.

Nicola: [Laughs]

Rosie: And then you go back and you're like 'I really wanted to

let you know that I actually had a really great time, thank

you so much' and they're like, yeah we understand.

Nicola: Bruce Forsyth.

Rosie: Yeah when Bruce Forsyth comes out with my mouth and

'We had a really great time'.

Nicola: [Laughs]

Rosie: That does sound cheesy because we actually can be quite

mean to each other.

Nicola: Mm yeah. When you won't even hug each other it just

feels like a strange thing to be overly effusive about

anything really.

Rosie: Yeah.

Rachel: But that hugging thing has made me feel a bit better.

Nicola: Yeah.

Cathy: I wouldn't go near Rachel.

Rosie: When was the last time you guys hugged?

Rachel: Oh we've never hugged.

Cathy: Never hugged.

Rachel: Even we move apart even talking.

Cathy: I'd be upset if she touched me on a sofa.

Rosie: Yeah, every now and again we'll do that and you're like

'Oh Jesus, why did you do that?'

Nicola: Yeah.

Rachel: Yeah.

Rosie: Or we have to share a bed a lot, especially in the first

couple of years if we were touring or at Edinburgh Fringe. That was one of our biggest expenses, if you wanted to get two hotel rooms and the only way we could really tour or do Fringe is if we shared a bed. And we'd roll over in the night and the other one is facing you. And that would be one of the worst things I could ever experience.

Nicola: It made me so sad.

Cathy: Oh I'm OK with that.

Rachel: No you're right, we have shared beds.

Cathy: We shared beds.

Rachel: And that's OK.

Cathy: And I'm OK with that but Rachel...

Rachel: Yeah that's because I don't move! I sleep like this.

Cathy: And also Rachel talks all night, that's all she does.

Nicola: Fucking hell, so does Rosie.

Rosie: This is so funny, I sleep talk.

Nicola: And Rosie does this thing, if she's sleep talking where

she'll ask a question and if you don't answer it, she'll tap

you on the shoulder...

Cathy: Oh no.

Nicola: ...for an answer, where you're like 'Fuck off'.

Rosie: [Laughs]

Nicola: Aww, the amount of times I've nearly punched her in like

a fucking Nottingham Travelodge because she want to know like where her friend Jess is. And you're like 'I don't

fucking know'.

Cathy: Oh wow.

Nicola: And you'll try and ignore it and she'll wait. So you have to

be like 'Have you checked the wardrobe?' And then she'll fuck off and go to sleep. But you have to give her an

answer and it pisses me off so much. It's just that.

Rosie: [Laughs]

Cathy: That's weird.

Nicola: A little tiny tap and I'm like, you've got to fuck off away

from me.

Cathy: And that's in your sleep?

Nicola: Yeah.

Rachel: Yeah. Did you ever share a room when you were kids?

Nicola: When we were really, really young, we had bunk beds

when we were kids.

Rosie: Bunk beds yeah. Did you have bunk beds?

Cathy: No. No.

Rosie: Oh, when I think about bunk beds, they're a gift to kids,

they're the funnest things in the world.

Cathy: Oh I disagree I think they're horrible.

Rachel: They're amazing.

Rosie: You'd get to fall out of them, jump out. We'd put all your

pillows on the floor and jump from the top bunk and

smash your head.

Nicola: [Laughs]

Cathy: Oh no.

Rosie: Oh I loved bunk beds, climbing, they were just monkey

bars.

Rachel: Can I just go sorry, go back to the sharing a bed.

Rosie: Oh yeah.

Rachel: Did you ever share a bed...

Cathy: Did either of you try and shag the other in the night like

Rachel? Hey maybe.

Nicola: [Laughs]

Rachel: Oh fucking hell.

Nicola: This is the podcast where we reveal that we're sisters

who fuck.

Rosie: Yeah.

Nicola: This definitely will have the most plays.

Rachel: Yeah exactly...
