Leila: 'Am I the asshole for not wanting to spend my summer

Priya:

[Laughs]

[Here to Judge-Interim Music]

Priya: OK so this next one has come from the Here to Judge

postbag, a postbag for the listeners. It is apparently a bag full of letters that used to exist in the '80s according to Steve our producer. Which I'm suspicious of, but here we go. There's a letter from Ellis James, aged 40, and it has a
