Priya: Welcome to Here to Judge where we scour the internet

Priya: Is he racist?

Leila: Well I'm sorry he's like 'I made an idyllic universe where

no people of colour exist and everyone is extremely

skinny and white'. Um?

Priya: That's because white people are spooky Leila.

Leila: White people are cool and kooky and spooky, and brown

people they ruin the cinematography guys! Yeah they have two separate houses with a tunnel between them.

Robin: Actually a tunnel?

Leila: Yeah I think so.

Priya: So you think every night she's bricking up that tunnel?

Leila: Yeah I would do.

Priya: OK this is another one from Reddit. 'Am I the asshole for

Leila: Of course you got this one.

Priya: Yeah I mean, it's 100% haunted but let's go.

Leila: Haunted.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: 'We're in our early 30s with kids. We decided to sell our

home and upgrade to a bigger one. We were looking for houses for a couple months and finding it frustrating. Got outbid on one we really liked. Then my husband told me his co-worker was selling his house and thought we might be interested. Me and my husband went over for dinner, had a good time and got a good look at the house. Robin: I'm 100% on the husband's side here.

Priya: Really?

Leila: Are you?

Priya: Typical man [laughs]. Typical rational man.

Robin: [Laughs] I am with him, ghosts do not exist. If this
