Robin: Welcome to Here to Judge where we scour the internet

to dissect dilemmas and decide who's to blame. Here to

Judge today is me, Robin Morgan.

Leila: Me, Leila Navabi.

Priya: And me, Priya Hall.

'Am the asshole telling the truth in a wedding toast? I'm a 30 year old male and my best friend got married last week. I just bought a house and my wife is expecting our son in November, so I let him know I was limited in what I could contribute financially, but did tell him I would try my best. So I went to the bachelor party in Maine. I rented the tux, I paid for mine and my wife's dinner at the rehearsal dinner. I also had a gift of \$300 that I was going to give them, but we will get to why I didn't give it to them. His (now wife, then fiancée) texted me multiple times a day with updates, fine. I didn't always respond and it got to the point where if I didn't respond at least once a day, I'd get a call from my buddy. (I have a full time job and I'm redoing some rooms in the house, so I'm busy.) She texted me for the following reasons'. Just for reference this is a bullet pointed and numbered list.

Leila: Oh my god.

Robin: Christ.

Priya: '1) My wife was not allowed to talk about our pregnancy

at all. She didn't want anyone to focus on that more than her, the bride. 2) She was not going to order special food for my wife (no one asked her to, my wife was fine with

whatever she was going to be served.)'

Leila: [Laughs]

Priya: '3) I was not helping the groom enough, he had to help

her with favours, seating charts and programs, so I had to help him with those things, according to her. She also said to get ready to help with thank you notes after the wedding. 4) She said if I was a true best man, I would offer to pay for the bar bill. I don't even know what that

means.'

Priya: 5)

Robin: Wow.

Priya: I know this is so long.

Leila: This is crazy.

Priya: [Laughs] 'She had to read a approve my speech before

the rehearsal dinner and wanted to be included as much, as my buddy. She told me to make up things up if I had to. I was also not allowed to include anyone but the two of them and no inside jokes or stories about my buddy that didn't include her. 6) Her last text said to tell my wife to keep it together and not make a pregnancy scene during the wedding. Also, she wanted her to choose a dress that downplayed her pregnancy as much as

possible.'

Leila: What the fuck?!

Priya: I know.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: 'I was just so aggravated, I spoke to my friend to see if he

could reason with her. He told me to just play ball on this one, it's her day and to cut him a break because he'd be

dealing with her nonsense for the rest of his life.'

Leila: Oh my god.

Robin: Oh that's so sad.

Priya: 'I was annoyed but calmed down.' It's so bleak isn't it?

Leila: Run for the fuckin' hills run.

Priya: 'The day of, all the bride and my buddy do is scold me,

berate me, and bark orders. I head down to the bar for the a drink, the bride's mother is there and warns me not to get drunk because I've ruined her daughter's day enough. Final straw. I didn't give them the card with the cash and in the speech, I used my friend's exact wording about having to deal with her nonsense for the rest of his

life.'

Robin: No way.

Priya: 'I wished them the best and told him I'd always be there

for him, especially during the divorce.'

Leila: Ah yes!

Priya: 'Am I the asshole?'

Robin: Ohhhh!

Leila: Not even a bit, no.

Priya: This is brutal.

Robin: That is such a lovely way of finishing this off.

Leila: Brutal.

Robin: I completely forgot the title of this and I was just feeling

sad for the guy. And he's absolutely smashed it.

Leila: Yeah, no that's what you would do isn't it? If it was me at

this point I think I'd be like 'I'm not being your best man, you need to run very far away, this is terrible, don't get

married.'.

Priya: I say run as soon as it becomes obvious that the bride

hates pregnant women. Like is that not immediately

obvious that she hates them?

Leila: Yeah the fact that it was like she's going to give him, like

what can't pregnant women eat? It's going be like Yakult?

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: Like everything that could possibly kill the baby that she's

just literally going to like induce an abortion.

Priya: Just unpasteurised milk.

Robin: It will be raw meat, loads of shellfish, caffeine induced

shellfish and she has to eat it on a trampoline whilst

doing heroine.

Leila: Yeah what the hell.

Priya: She's drinking from a carafe of gin for the whole thing.

Robin: Yeah [laughs]

Leila: No actually maybe he was right to keep doing the speech

because it was almost like she just kept going. You know when someone wants to fuck you off and you're doing really well? But they keep 'You can't do this, and also you can't do this and also don't do'. Have you ever had that?

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: Someone wants to piss you off that badly, especially like

if you worked in retail in your life, that's definitely like a managerial. I remember there was this one woman when I was working at John Lewis, it was like one of the managers who would be like 'Oh Leila you can't wrap the

mugs because you don't have wrap training'.

Robin: I thought you are going to say 'You're not allowed to rap,

you're not allowed to rap in the shop'.

Priya: Leila she might have had a point.

Leila: [Rapping] What the hell? You've ruined my life. Why do I

work here every night? Yeah [laughs].

Robin: Just trying to become the new Christmas advert with like

rapping [laughs].

Leila: [Laughs]

Robin: They're bound to see it.

Priya: And the rapping is all incredibly offensive Leila. It's two

o'clock in the afternoon in a John Lewis.

Leila: [Laughs] Oh god. No, they called it wrap training and they

were like 'You haven't done it'. And I was like 'No worries' and then she'd demean me constantly in front of customers, and it would be like constant, constant, constant and it got to the point where I just wasn't giving her any reaction and she clearly wanted me to blow up at her or something. And she got so irritated that I wasn't giving her a reaction that she went 'Bwah!' at me, just like that once, and I was like OK. And she was like

'Nothing fazes you!' That's what this is.

Robin: No way, she actually said that?

Priya: She practically admitted it.

Leila: Yes, yes. She went like 'Ahhhh!' like that in my face.

character.

Priya: I'm not here.

Priya: I think that's called disassociating Leila.

Leila: Yeah [laughs].

Priya: I think it's a symptom rather than a defence mechanism.

Leila: [Laughs] Yeah it's like if you had an operation and you

wake up afterwards and it's like no time has passed, do you know what I mean? Like I'd walk out of that building

and then be like, oh back in my body.

Robin: Yeah it's like crossing the threshold is becoming

lobotomised and then going back in [laughs].

Leila: Yeah, yeah, Yeah, yeah, I would walk in there and

yeah disassociate to get through a job in retail.

Robin: I just remembered those things of like my retail jobs of

the thing of having to put stuff, did you have lockers at

John Lewis?

Leila: Yeah, yeah, yeah of course.

Robin: That for the moment for me I think is when you're like,

oh it's because you know before you start...

Leila: Yeah and it said on the inside of them 'Don't forget to

smile' as well.

Robin: Ahhhhhh!

Priya: When I worked in cinema we had like a key-card log-in

system.

Leila: Yeah.

Robin: Sure.

Priya: And it was doing that and some people would avoid

doing that for as long as possible because it was just so

soul crushing [laughs].

Leila: Yeah.

Robin: Yeah of course.

Priya: Seeing all the signs being like 'Remember you're not

allowed to steal anything from concessions. You're not

allowed to be rude to the customers'.

Leila: All the fuckin' things. Like as if you're going to drink the

melted cheese. Is that what they're like?

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: We're in a cinema, I don't want to eat this food, I've seen

how many children touch it like.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: Oh stop! That's so grim. Yeah.

Robin: Slush Puppies in your pockets by the end of the day.

Leila: Yeah Tango Ice Blasts.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: Just like whole hotdogs.

Leila: [Laughs]

Robin: Open up a jacket and like there's just loads of hotdogs

inside it.

Leila: [Laughs]

Priya: But one guy did once steal some chicken nuggets from

the cinema I worked in and my main memory from that job is him eating them in the staffroom and just going

'These chicken nuggets taste like ass!'

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: And being like OK I need to leave.

Leila: Yeah what the fuck yeah. Do you know I've never done

that but like.

Robin: Oh god [laughs].

Leila: You could like go fine dining for the price of like a cinema.

This is so not related to this story at all.

Priya: I think we got distracted from the wedding.

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: I think he is an asshole but I think he's a justified asshole.

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: It's definitely an asshole move but completely

understandable given the circumstance.

Robin: Totally.

Leila: Oh but you would be wouldn't you? You'd have to.

Robin: I'm glad he's defended himself.

Priya: I think he should have bowed out straightaway. As soon

as she started ragging on his pregnant wife, I think he

should have been like oh this isn't...

Robin: I mean this woman sounds unhappy.

Priya: Mm yeah.

Leila: So does he!

Robin: And the fact that the dude is just like 'It's her day, it's her

day' not our day, it's her day. That's a red flag.

Priya: The groom being like I'm going to have to put up with her

nonsense for the rest of my life I don't know why you're

complaining.

Leila: Yeah!

Robin: Oh it's so sad isn't it?

Priya: Jesus Christ what a lot of effort and money to go to, to be

legally bound to someone you hate.

Leila: If you're a good best man which I'm assuming means

you're his closest friend, that's when you sit down with

that person and say 'I don't think you should do this'.

Robin: Yeah. Mad.

Leila: 'Am I the asshole for taking a weekend to myself over the

death of a fictional character?' Hang on, look my lovely girlfriend has brought me a cup of tea, thank you so

much [laughs].

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: It's good isn't it? Right. OK let me do this. 'So, Saturday

evening I (Female 22)' I'm going to say now, this isn't me. I feel like I've been given this deliberately, right here we are. 'Saturday evening I (Female 22) I was supposed to go out with a friend. We didn't have any particular plan, we just wanted to hang out and maybe grab a coke or

whatever.'

Robin: [Laughs] It was in the '60s.

Leila: Yeah [laughs] Grab a coke, yeah, yeah, yeah. 'I was

reading a book, earlier this week and my favourite character died. It was a pretty terrible death, it was a young character, and well there were a lot of details about his death that were pretty heartbreaking to me. I still cry when I think about it.' Oh my god this person is

such a wet wipe, sorry.

Robin: A wet wipe!

Priya: What a description.

Leila: 'I often react in similar ways to the deaths of fictional

characters, but I have a couple of coping mechanisms. I

write fan fictions'

Robin: Of course you do. Of course you do.

Leila: 'But somehow this time it only made things worse. I talk

to other people who have read the book, but this series seems to have no fan base. So I just decided to allow myself to grieve, how stupid it may sound, and I took a weekend to take care of myself and cry while eating ice

cream.'

Robin: Imagine if this book is the bible and the character is

Jesus.

Leila: Yeah [laughs] I was going to say, yeah, yeah, yeah aw god. 'I told my friend I couldn't go out with her and asked

if we could reschedule for next week, she said 'no problem'. However, today she asked me if I was alright and why had I rescheduled. She's my oldest friend, she knows me well, so I decided I might as well just tell her the truth, and I did, thinking nothing of it. She was appalled and called me an asshole for caring more about a fictional character than her. But I mean, that's not what happened, I just get emotional over stupid things sometimes and I need to disconnect myself from the

world to deal with it. Also, if she had told me she couldn't

reschedule I would have hung out with her anyway. So am I the asshole?'

Priya: What a dweeb. What a fucking dweeb.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: Yeah sorry this is proper damp innit? It's like I want to

have patience with people like this but when there are so many actual people dying in the world, that's when I'm like. Back in maybe 2014 when everything was fine, fine

like be upset about a fictional character you have nothing

else to be upset over. Now you're not allowed to be upset over fictional characters I've decided, that's my.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: I think that's a good shout.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: Yeah?

Priya: The ocean is on fire, there are worse things to be worried

about than your book that is probably bad if it has no fan

base.

Robin: I'd love to know what it is.

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: What book? Like do you know what I mean? She wrote

fan fiction about it but it has no fan base.

Robin: Yeah so she's just writing fiction [laughs].

Priya: Yeah she's just writing, she is fan.

Robin: Yeah [laughs].

Leila: Also isn't fan fiction sexual? Or am I going mad?

Robin: Often times yes, I mean sometimes it's sex based.

Leila: Isn't that what it is? Isn't it like a? I thought in my head, I

had a friend when One Direction were really popular who

used to write One Direction.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: And when I say I had a friend it wasn't me, definitely I

swear to god it wasn't. That's what that sounded like.

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: I remember she showed me once and it was like he put

his boiling hot cock into my.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: And it was really like, it was really horrible.

Priya: It shouldn't be boiling hot [laughs] It shouldn't be hot.

Leila: [Laughs] I know.

Robin: Can we please put a trigger warning on? Because

honestly if anyone has a boiling hot cock this will really.

Leila: Boiling hot cock [laughs]. I'm proposing a series now,

lesbian writes...

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Priya: Yes please.

Leila: ...gay fan fiction about gay men or just penises in general.

Because I have no clue. It's boiling hot! That's how it

works isn't it? Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Robin: That's so funny. You should write sex for straight men

[laughs].

Priya: Oh yes, please.

Leila: My boiling hot cock is smiling at you, yeah [laughs].

Robin: It's respecting you.

Leila: This episode is called Boiling Hot Cock, it just is now.

Robin: There goes the sponsors.

Leila: Yeah bye everyone.

Priya: I will say, I have been a dweeb that reads fan fiction.

Leila: Have you?

Priya: Not sexual ones, because they're all really creepy and

they have boiling hot cocks.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: If it's for something, like say you enjoy a book or a TV

show, I don't do it now. Say you enjoy a book or a TV show and you want more of that content it used to be that all you could do was read fan fiction. And it was bad.

Leila: Like read the same thing written by teenagers.

Robin: What did you? What was the book or film?

Priya: Buffy the Vampire Slayer.

Robin: OK.

Priya: And Firefly. I've been this dweeb but I would never miss

out on an actual social engagement because I was crying

over a fictional character. Get a grip.

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: If I got a grip, you can get a grip.

Leila: I'm trying to think if I've ever cried over a fictional

character? I mean yeah, I really cried at Mae Martin's

show.

Robin: There's not enough boiling hot cocks in that show for me.

Leila: There's not enough boiling hot cocks, yeah there really

aren't.

Robin: No, no, no.

Priya: If anything there's too many boiling hot cocks in that

show.

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: Yeah I cry at Disney films but like that's why I don't watch

them.

Priya: Yeah.

Robin: Do you reckon people have written fan fiction about

Disney films?

Leila: Yes.

Priya: Oh for sure.

Robin: Like sexual fan fiction?

Leila: Yes. Yeah I'm sure.

Priya: Yeah, no doubt.

Robin: Really? Eww.

Leila: 100%.

Priya: That should be a podcast, where we review Disney based

erotic fan fiction.

Leila: I feel like every week we're like just going for a better

idea for a podcast than our podcast [laughs]. I'm like now we should just do one where we dissect lyrics from songs.

Robin: We could do it like a spinoff episode.

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: I would like to do that.

Priya: You describing this person as a wet wipe really resonated

with me and that's how I'm going to describe myself from

now on.

Leila: Yeah.

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: But even I have not been in this state.

Robin: Well that's it, that's what I was going to say at the start.

Like it's quite rare to sort of feel like I have the upper hand in terms of not being the biggest wet wiper known in a conversation. Like all three of us feel that way about

this person.

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: Yeah.

Robin: It's great.

Priya: Once in my school we had to do a presentation on song

lyrics, we had to choose song lyrics and do like an analysis of them. And someone chose Family Portrait by P!nk and

I cried throughout the presentation.

Leila: [Laughs hysterically]

Robin: [Claps]

Priya: And I remember all of us going 'We shouldn't be here'.

Leila: Is this person a big les now? Is that? Are they? They are

aren't they?

Priya: Oh my god yeah [laughs].

Leila: Yeah of course they are! Of course they are yeah 100%.

Yeah P!nk. I'm sorry there are two types of lesbian in my opinion, there are only two types it's very binary. It's I love P!nk and I'm deeply uncool. Or I hate P!nk and I'm really fucking cool. And I would like to put myself in the I really don't like P!nk's music at all, it really grinds my

gears.

Robin: [Laughs] I love how P!nk is literally the like the middle of

the entire lesbian culture.

Leila: I can't stand P!nk. Yeah it is, it really does. It separates us

all apart like.

Priya: [Laughs] There's P!nk and Shannon Matthews.

Robin: Yeah [laughs].

Leila: Yeah it is, it is.

Priya: Are you a P!nk lesbian or a Shannon Matthews lesbian?

Robin: That is so funny.

Leila: Yeah that is genuinely true, of course she is. Yeah people

who cry at P!nk songs. Ugh.

Robin: That is amazing, going into a gay bar 'P!nk or Shannon?

P!nk that way, Shannon that way'.

Leila: What song did you do Priya?

Priya: What song did I do? I think I put off doing it for the

longest time because I didn't like public speaking. And

then eventually just graduated [laughs].

Leila: Oh brilliant.

Priya: Without doing it at all [laughs].

Robin: Do you think they're going to ask you to go back now

you're famous and you'll have to do it?

Leila: Yeah.

Robin: At a sort of um alumni event.

Priya: I think they will never let me into that school after

listening to the Podcast. It's a great idea for an English teacher to go like, 'They hate poetry, what about your sad angsty teen songs? What about you talk about them

instead'.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: Yeah that is really good.

Priya: A shout out to my English teacher, she was great.

Robin: Mine English teacher she did the sort of thing she was

really into it, she was really, really good and she awarded

me poet laureate in sixth form.

Priya: Aww.

Robin: And then my first year of uni I had to go back to school

and accept this award and I was very nervous and shy, I had to walk onto the stage and get given this. And my teacher had written this like bio for me. 'His poetry is very influenced by music' and I think I just sort of like copied and pasted my death metal band lyrics for some

of it.

Leila: When I was a young man my father...

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah. Took me into the city...

Priya: Is this death metal guys?

Robin: Yeah, yeah.

Leila: Yeah that's death metal in my eyes.

Robin: It's not and I want everyone to know that I know that it's

not. So I walked onto the stage and the guy who was just some fuckin' dude, I think he was like a local MP or councillor or something? Sort of said 'So what music are you influenced by?' In this kind of like sort of like

handover thing.

Leila: Oh.

Robin: And I uh panicked and said Lighthouse Family.

Priya: [Laughs]

Robin: There we go, you know shy boy.

Leila: Aww.

Priya: He was a people pleaser.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: I've got to tell you something now. I'm scared to tell it

because it's so good that you have to keep it in but I'm worried that this person will hear it. There is a woman

[laughs]...

Priya: Oh no.

Leila: There's a woman out there that claims to be the LGBT

poet laureate right. Her website is LGBTpoetlaureate.com That award doesn't exist. And she headlined London

Pride.

Robin: Nooooo!

Leila: Or did the main stage at London Pride. She does gigs all

the time with like lesbian comics and is like she was awarded the LGBT poet laureateship in 2016. And you look it up, it's never existed, she's made up this title. And she's made so much fucking money off pretending she's the LGBT poet laureate whatever the fuck that is [laughs].

Robin: That's amazing.

Leila: I'm telling you, she's quite like big because she calls

herself the LGBT poet laureate but it's never existed.

Priya: I've got so much respect for that.

Robin: It is insane isn't it?

Leila: The role of LGBT poet laureate [bleep] has become the

inaugural LGBT+ poet laureate since 2016. There has

never been another one.

Priya: [Laughs] She's appointed it herself.

Leila: [Laughs] Yeah exactly, isn't that amazing?

Robin: It's just like me calling myself it's just like a name isn't it?

She's just branded herself as that.

Leila: I'm going to start calling myself Lesbian Comic of the

Year.

Robin: Yeah totally.

Leila: Fuck it.

Robin: Oh that would be so good wouldn't it?

Leila:

I'm a fan. I think this is such a great idea. Just give yourself an award. Like fuck these awards. Let's be honest though, right. Awards in general, and I'm sorry if either of you have ever won awards right, but I think awards are absolute tosh, bollocks. It's just old men sitting in a room deciding which other like, I hate, how can you make people compete like that for titles? I think it's all stupid. So you might as well just call yourself whatever you want to call yourself I think.

Robin: So are you saying that the high school poet laureate

award was not...

Leila: [Laughs] No you're allowed that one.

Robin: That's lovely, but awards are bullshit! So...

Leila: No not all awards, comedy awards.

Robin: Tell them to go fuck himself.

Leila: Specially comedy awards. And I'm not just saying that

because I've never won one all right? But actually I have because I'm LGBTQ Community Comedian of the Year.

Robin: And podcaster of the year as well.

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: Five years running. Here to Judge, can we start calling

ourselves the Podcast of the Year?

Priya: [Laughs] I'm sure Podcast of the Year actually exists as an

award so we need to go for one that isn't real on account

of fraud.

Leila: OK but we'll be like the PRL Podcast of the Year.

Priya: Yeah fully onboard with that.

Leila: Priya, Robin and Leila's podcast. No one fucking...

Robin: It took me a little while. It took me a little while to work

that out.

Priya: He's sleepy today.

Leila: PRL Podcast of the Year 2020 and 2021.

Priya: Delicious, yes please.

Leila: I think that's brilliant.

Robin: Yeah nice.

Priya: And we can just refer to ourselves as award winning all

the time.

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: Award winning comedians.

Robin: What was the story?

Leila: This is the asshole fictional character one.

Priya: Oh right yeah.

Robin: Um?

Priya: I think asshole.

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: It is rude to her friend. Keep your messiness to yourself.

We've all been there but get a grip.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: Just like hide it, just lie about your issues.

Robin: Yes correct.

Leila: That's a lesson we like to perpetuate on [sings] Here to

Judge.

Robin: The award winning Here to Judge.

Leila: The award winning podcast Here to Judge.

Priya: [Laughs]

[Here to Judge-interim music]

[Promotion for Who Are You Wearing?]

[Here to Judge- interim music]

Robin:

OK we're off to the land of Reddit. 'Am I the asshole for telling my girlfriend that her cosplay is incorrect? Me, 23 female and my girlfriend, 24 female, were going to go to an event in cosplay as a couple. This was a cosplay picnic outside. She was going as a character from a show we like and I was going as a character this character ends up in a relationship with. Her character is a butler but hasn't always been that (This is important!) We were both going to base our costumes on the movie costumes, so that we could match. Her character does not wear white gloves in the movie and haven't wore them since the first season of the series. White gloves are therefore very inaccurate for this character. She still made white gloves for her cosplay. I think there is some Mandela effect going on because she swore he wears white gloves in the movie but he doesn't and the movie poster clearly shows him without white gloves' I don't know what the Mandela effect is, let's talk about that in a second.

Priya: [Laughs]

Robin:

She got upset with me and says I'm wrong and also always nitpicking. I said 'I'm not nitpicking and I'm not wrong and that butlers shouldn't wear white gloves!' Cool. 'She said the brim of my hat is one inch too big for the era and I should focus on that instead (she's an milliner focusing on historical hats). I said the character has a large brim in the movie and it's a movie inaccuracy, not an inaccuracy from my side. She said she's not going with me to the picnic if I'm going to

you. It's going to be so bad [laughs].

Leila: Leila, gay, laugh!

Leila: Priya 2020, I'll be 2021, Welsh Comedian of the Year.

Robin: No when we next gig on the same bill we should all come

on stage and say 'I am the Welsh Comedian of the Year'.

Leila: I bet, yeah, yeah, yeah.

Priya: And then we'd battle at the end.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah, great.

Leila: That's so good. We should just make our own

Shut up.

Robin: Save it [laughs].

Leila: Leila Navabi has a meltdown in a podcast, right.

Robin: Yeah. I think they're both assholes and I think they can

really use the absolutely dynamite Leave Your Partner by

Robin, song.

Priya: Agreed.

Robin: Which I love.

Leila: I loved it.
