Priya: Welcome to Here to Judge where we scour the internet

to dissect dilemmas and decide who's to blame. Here to

Judge today is me, Priya Hall.

Robin: Me, Robin Morgan.

Leila: And me, Leila Navabi.

Robin: 'Am I the asshole for loudly saying 'Oh fuck!' in a movie

> theatre. Yesterday I went to see a movie with a couple friends. The movie ended up having an incredible twist.

> I'm not gonna say the name because revealing that a movie has a huge twist can be a spoiler in itself (the twist

> is more predictable when you know there's a twist).

When the twist happened, I was completely mind blown and shocked. Without even realising what I was doing, I

instinctively let out a rather loud 'Oh fuck!' It wasn't like I

shouted, but it was loud enough for people around me to hear. After the movie, a middle aged man walked up to

Priya: Wait a second, I've just twigged!

Leila: [Laughs] The Resurrection is like wow! Yeah.

Robin: Oh my God!

Priya: It's back!

Robin: 'It's' back [laughs].

Leila: It's back [laughs].

Priya: I'm all for making sounds in movie theatres.

Leila: Oh it depends, if it's constant, there's some people that

go to the cinema with the sole aim of like being the

centre of attention. Have you had that?

Robin: Really?

Leila: Oh yeah.

Robin: I haven't been in ages. Like I've been to the cinema with

my kids and that's just screaming of children.

Leila: Yeah that's different.

Robin: That's a different vibe where you basically have to go like

'Shhh, you whisper in the cinema' and then a ten-year-old

like shitting his pants.

Priya: Shouts 'Oh fuck'.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, Jesus Christ! OK so centre of attention

in what way?

Leila: Like they'll go like, so, I hate this and people do it in the

theatre as well and at comedy gigs, they do it in all these places where you're meant to be an audience right where they'll do one thing that's probably by accident and they go 'Oh yeah' so they agree you know. And everyone will be like 'Oh what?' And then they'll get addicted to that

high.

Priya: Sure.

Robin: Yeah it's audience members getting increasingly more

confident based on the initial reaction to it.

Leila: Yeah. I mean fine once, I honestly think fine once.

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: Yeah it's like you said, when they get addicted to the

attention that's dangerous territory as we all know.

Leila: So that's why you can't be complicit you know? If

someone in the cinema does a loud noise I think you have to in the interest of like the rest of the

film/whatever, go 'Shhh!'

Robin: Sure [Laughs]

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: You have to do that to like keep 'em on their toes.

Robin: Mm-hmm.

Leila: To like hit them with that shame across the face and then

it's like they won't do it again.

Priya: We can't ever go and see a film together. That can never

be allowed to happen.

Leila: No I hate that.

Priya: You'd get so annoyed by me.

Leila: Oh I would...

Robin: Are you really bad?

Priya: I'm not like, I'm not that, I don't talk through but say if

I'm crying in a cinema, I'm fully crying in a cinema.

Leila: Oh that's different as well. That's different if it's like a

really cry-y film like crying you can't help.

Priya: Yeah sure.

Leila: I mean when people react. Like especially if it's like a

comedy and they're like 'Bloody brilliant!' You're like shut

up. Yeah that's what I mean.

Priya: Have you ever been to a cinema in the valleys?

Leila: Uh? Yes.

Priya: Completely different vibe innit?

Leila: Yeah that's different.

Robin: Would you class Nantgarw as the valleys?

Priya: Uh yeah, I used to work in that cinema.

Leila: Did you?

Priya: Yeah.

Robin: Uh that's where I go with my son.

Priya: Aww cute.

Robin: But it's like the 11am showing of The Gruffalo's Child.

Leila: Oh boy.

Robin: And I'm there just like 'Jesus Christ!'

Priya: [Laughs]

Robin: He's got a child now?

Leila: Where were we? Oh yeah shouting out at the cinema. I

think in terms of saying 'Fuck' in front of a child I always

feel bad.

Robin: Mm.

Priya: So I was with you up until this point but a R-rated film is

an 18 right?

Leila: Is it?

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: So if there's a child in there that's the parent's fault and

they're going to hear some fucks.

Leila: Yeah that's ridiculous yeah, yeah, no I agree.

Robin: Yeah totally.

Leila: Is R-rated an 18?

Priya: I think so.

Robin: I think so yeah because I think...

Leila: Yeah if you're in that environment then fine, you can't

just be like, oh if this child hears? I think that's ridiculous.

Priya: How did the child get in?

Leila: Yeah.

Priya: That's what we should be asking.

Robin: Do you remember how scared you used to be bringing

your own snacks in?

Leila: Yes.

Robin: I remember being petrified. Petrified.

Leila: I don't think they check anymore. They don't check

anymore.

Robin: But you are allowed.

Priya: Anything that's not hot that the rule in Showcase, that's

what we used to say.

Robin: Oh really?

Priya: Yeah so people would be hiding their Haribos and I would

be like 'Look, look me in the eye'.

Robin: Yeah [laughs].

Priya: 'I do not give a shit about your Haribos. I do not give a

shit. Get out of my face'.

Leila: But hot food because it's in like a?

Priya: Because it smells. Do you know what? The amount of

Chinese takeaways I had to confiscate off people. The

amount.

Leila: Aww Priya!

Robin: No way.

Priya: And also people were really good at sneaking them in, so

I would go into clean afterwards and there would just be like sweet and sour chicken all over the floor of the

cinema and I'd have to clean it up.

Leila: Aww.

Robin: That is gross.

Leila: That's gross.

Priya: Rank. Twilight was a warzone. I worked there when the

last Twilight came out and it was, I've never seen

anything quite like it.

Leila: I'll tell you what I last saw at Showcase was they did

Titanic, I can't remember, it was like an anniversary of Titanic coming out or something. And they put it on and my god, I was maybe like 14 and I'd never seen it before. And I went with all my gal pals from school who were all like 14. And they were just sobbing their way through it and I remember distinctly sitting there being like, I feel nothing. And just not realising. I don't know why still to this day, I'm like am I emotionally void? That like I just sat

there in Titanic and was like this is a bit long now.

Priya: [Laughs]

Robin: Swearing is something that I feel like, I swear quite a lot

on stage and off stage and I think my parents always did as well so it was never an issue. But I know some people

that it's incredibly offensive to people isn't it?

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: But people are so offended.

Robin: That makes me always feel a little bit suspicious when

people are sort of that worried about swearing.

Leila: Yeah.

Robin: When you think of actual bad behaviour you know?

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: Yeah.

Priya: I had a friend who was such a dyed-in-the-wool angel

that he put a self-imposed swearing ban on himself until

the age of 18 and then he was allowed to swear.

Robin: How old was he when he did this?

Priya: Um? Well I've known him since I was 13. And he did not

swear until age 18 [laughs].

Leila: So on his 18th birthday he was just like...

Priya: Just as the clock struck he was like 'Fuck, fuck, fuck!' No.

Leila: Really?

Robin: Bloody hell! [Laughs]

Leila: Robin I can't remember what you said, you're always a bit

suspicious of people that are like that.

Robin: Totally!

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: I always think it's the people that hate swearing that are

racists.

Robin: Totally. Totally.

Priya: They're trying to hold a lot in.

Leila: Yeah.

Priya: They're trying to conceal a lot.

Leila: Yeah.

Robin: If I start swearing everything will come out [laughs].

Leila: Yeah, yeah.

Robin: I don't think this guy's an asshole. I don't think swearing

is an issue. I think that if you're in an R-rated movie and you say 'Fucking hell' at a twist. And also like he's not

revealed the twist, he's not even revealed the movie, he seems like quite a sweet dude.

Priya: Yeah.

Robin: If it's a dude. I'm imagining it is, I don't know why.

Leila: Yeah I agree. I think it's fine.

Priya: I think one 'Oh fuck' is permitted in every social situation.

Robin: I did an open air gig on Friday in front of 1500 people,

biggest gig I've ever done. And it was really fun and really nice and Jarred Christmas compered and to start the show, got the youngest person he could find in the crowd to say 'Come on everyone clap your fucking hands'. And it

was this 12-year-old in front of her parents and stuff.

Leila: Oh my god.

Robin: And she went mad and the parents loved it. Obviously

the crowd loved it.

Leila: Yeah.

Robin: And then the next section he was like 'We could go

nuclear now, we could go like 'clap your mother fucking hands' and she looked at her parents and the parents nodded thinking this is going to like, but not after this

Leila: Yeah.

Robin: And then that was to bring me on. And I was like 'You

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: Yeah, yeah.

Robin: You know there's only one more word. I left, I don't know

if she did it but you know I hope it happened.

Leila: That's brilliant.

Priya: I hope she did it unprompted.

Robin: Yeah, yeah exactly. 'Come on you bunch of...

Priya: Oh it's me. Always the cat ones for Priya.

Leila: [Laughs]

Priya: 'Am I the buttface for emotionally manipulating my cat?

When I got my cat he was a kitten and very snugly/needy which was adorable. Now he's two and seems to believe it's no longer "cool" in quotation marks to hang out with daddy. He ignores me all day, comes out of his cat castle twice a day to eat and use the bathroom but otherwise either stays in the cat castle or wanders the apartment ignoring me. Robin: Oh my god.

Priya:

And then when he comes over, pretending to sleepwalk back to my bed holding a can of beans or something as if it were my cat. My friends say this is wrong but I still feed and take care of him. I just refuse to play his games. I mean why have a cat if you're never going to pet it or be with it? Also my tactic appears to be working but does it make me the asshole?' Just completely abandoned the buttface there at the end.

Robin:

Yeah, yeah, he got to into it. I love this. I love this a lot.

Leila:

I think we should all be putting cats, you know as a very proud owner of a cat whom I adore, I think we should all be putting cats in their place a little bit.

Priya:

Oh yeah. You get a cat like mine if you don't keep them humble. Completely in control of the house.

Leila:

Yeah.

Robin:

I think this is what the surprising thing of it is that I've never heard of a cat who is not the alpha in the relationship. Like this feels quite, yeah I quite like this.

Priya:

This guy thinks he's the alpha but I imagine that cat is completely just nonplussed by his activities. The cat sees him in his bed, in the cat's bed just like OK that's fine.

Robin:

Priya:

Leila:

Priya:

Leila:

Robin: Meow.

Robin: Sure.

Leila: Have you ever done cat things to pretend, like my cat

it.

Priya: Yeah and like scratching the post to teach them that they

can scratch it.

Leila: Yeah.

Priya: My cat only plays with his toys when I play with his toys

and it's only to stop me from playing with them.

Leila: Yeah.

Priya: Tragic. I also have a certain meow that sounds like a

kitten that can bring my cat in from another room, and he comes in to check that the kitten is OK and then sees it's me and then immediately turns and leaves the room.

And every time it breaks my little heart.

Leila: That's adorable.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Leila: Hi beans nice to see you.

Robin: Hi beans.

Leila: [Laughs]

Robin: So cute. No I would absolutely, all I want is for her to love

me and I'm sure she does.

Leila: Aww.

Robin: But I wish she showed it more often.

Priya: [Laughs]

Robin: It hurts my heart. Because I've been away for like, today

was the first day I've been able to do bedtime in sort of 10 to 11 days, so I feel like, I always remember Rob Brown talking about this on a podcast having to sort of basically slot back into family life and you kind of like try not to get in the way because like everyone has been doing fine without you. And you just kind of feel oh sorry, sorry, sorry. She's been a bit snotty and ill, she's been extra clingy with Jen so the only fun bit we had today was

[laughs].

Leila: No I think completely reasonable.

Priya: Yeah not the buttface.

Leila: Right I'm going to go onto this one, from Mumsnet now.

'Am I being unreasonable to think that RSPB shouldn't say if you don't want to see naked men stay away from the

Leila: 'Am I being unreasonable to think that RSBP shouldn't say

if you don't want to see naked men, stay away from the

Priya: Isn't Sherwood Forest the Robin Hood one?

Priya: [Laughs]

Robin: This happened two years ago.

Priya: OK.

Robin: Didn't it?

Priya: Where are you getting this from?

Robin: She said 'Two years ago I visited Sherwood Forest'.

Priya: Oh OK yeah sure.

Robin: The OP. Do the RSPB own land?

Priya: Apparently or they manage it.

Leila: What's it actually? The Royal Preservation of what?

Priya: Birds.

Leila: Birds.

Robin: Birds.

Leila: Yeah so what's that go to? Is it like you're not really?

There's? What's that got to do with birds?

Priya: Within this landscape the RSPB manages two connected

reserves, woodland and healthland. So I guess they manage the area so that the trees don't get chopped down and that the birds are all fine and happy and seeing

all of the ballsacks they want to see.
