Cast:

Priya Hall Leila Navabi Robin Morgan

[Here to Judge Theme Song]

Robin: Welcome to Here to Judge where we scour the internet

to dissect dilemmas and decide who's to blame.

Leila: Here to Judge today is me, Leila Navabi.

Robin: Me, Robin Morgan.

Priya: Me, Priya Hall. And our wonderful live audience from

Assembly Festival in Coventry!

[Cheers and applause]

Priya: Delicious.

Robin: Thank you very much for being here. Shall we crack on?

Leila: Let's crack on. I'm going to go straight into the first story,

are we all ready to read this? This one's from Reddit I do believe. OK. 'Am I the asshole for switching to regular milk to prove my lactose intolerant roommate keeps

stealing from me?'

[Laughter]

'Me and two other guys share an apartment together and we all split all bills. The only thing we don't split costs on is groceries. Everyone is in charge of buying their own food and we don't touch whatever doesn't belong to us in the fridge. We put our names on everything so no one gets mixed up. The issue has been going on for almost a year, and I'm sick of it! One of my roommates R' just the letter R [chuckles] I'm assuming that's not their full name. 'keeps stealing my food. I get home from work and my containers with all my leftovers are sometimes missing. They have my name written on it. All my stuff finishes too

quick. My gallon of milk for example. I buy almond milk because I like the taste'. Bollocks.

Robin: Asshole. Calling it.

Leila: Asshole that's it.

Priya: Immediately.

Leila:

'But it seems to finish after a week even though I've only drank once or twice. I've confronted R about this lots of times and that's caused a lot of arguments. He outright denies it and tells me I'm crazy even though it's so obvious. My other roommate and I carpool together because we both work the same early morning shifts around the same area. So I know it's not him. It's always after we get home and R's already left for work that I notice my food has gone. My roommate also has a similar problem but not as often as I do. I'm guessing because R doesn't like what he buys.' [Laughs] Zing! 'The funny thing is, R buys a lot for himself and is even more stingy about his food. He will literally point out what's his when he comes back from grocery shopping and tell us not to touch it. Last week my milk was nearly empty again and I got fed up. I went to the liquor store and bought regular dairy milk' [laughs] Oh that famous liquor.

[Laughter]

I'm assuming dairy milk as in milk that is dairy and not a Dairy Milk the chocolate bar.

Robin: Yeah I think so yeah.

Leila: OK.

Robin: These fuckin' Americans man.

Leila: Yeah I know. So uncivilised.

Priya: Just call it how we feel.

Robin: Yeah [laughs].

Leila: Yeah, yeah, yeah. 'I drank what was left of my almond

milk and refilled the gallon with the one I'd bought. This was to catch/prove R is the one stealing since he is a

lactose intolerant.'

[Laughter]

Leila: 'The nxt day' that's what it says, there's no e, so I will

honour that. 'The nxt day Saturday we get back from work and R is pissed.' From the alcoholic milk, obviously

[laughs].

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: Uh no. 'He yelled at me that he was stuck in the bathroom for 40 minutes with diarrhea because of my

milk, he was using it to make a shake.' [Sighs] I hate Americans. 'I only responded with' I don't really,

Coventry, the famous home of Americans. 'I only

responded with 'So then you're the one who has been stealing'. He freaking exploded. Yeah he admitted he was

sometimes drinking my milk and eating my food but he was more mad that I switched milks than the fact that he

was caught. I told him that I wouldn't have done that if

he'd just stop taking my stuff from our fridge. Or at least told the truth instead of trying to make it seem like I was

making it up. My roommate backed me up and thought it

was kind of funny. He got payback from stealing from us. It's a little tense right now and my roommate said, little

does he know we're both looking to move somewhere else together because we're sick of his shit.' Literally as

well. 'I told some buddies what happened and a few think I was an asshole for that. I feel like I'm not in the wrong

here. He was taking my food and not even owning up to it and I want to prove it, does that make me TA?' which

stands for the asshole. OK so what do we think?

Priya: I definitely think this person is the asshole for writing a

full novel about how he's poisoned his roommate.

Leila: [Laughs]

Priya: I mean learn to edit.

Leila: Yeah that's a fair point.

Robin: I don't think he's the asshole.

Leila: Yeah that's how awful it is.

Robin: I think he's wonderful. I think this is the perfect way to

react to something. You know we've all lived in house shares and people have taken stuff. If you could the next day make your housemate shit themselves to death for

thieving things, I would do that 100%.

Leila: Right, having flatmates, how would you feel about

sharing food? Like if someone wants a drop of milk, are

you like?

Robin: Drop of milk is fine.

Priya: Robin's flatmates are his children.

Leila: [Laughs] Yeah that's true. That's true yeah.

Robin: They are so dependent.

Leila: Yeah, yeah [laughs] OK historical flatmates then.

Priya: OK.

Leila: That sounds like you were like Henry Tudor's flatmate

[laughs].

Priya: Would you poison Anne Boleyn?

Robin: Yeah. The ghost of Jane Seymour. A drop of milk is fine,

anything more than like something for a cup of tea I feel like is not OK. My friend when he lived in a house share in Swansea, his housemate used to steal his shampoo and

he knew that because it just went down. So my

housemate then pissed in the shampoo bottle.

[Laughter]

Leila: No! What's wrong? And you think that's OK?!

Priya: Just to set the tone of the show.

Robin: I think that's totally OK.

Leila: No! What shampoo was it?

Robin: Tresemme I don't know.

Leila: Alberto Balsam is my.

Priya: And you wouldn't know it was piss in Tresemme?

Robin: That's the genius of it.

[Laughter]

Leila: I don't believe in Tresemme. There I've said it.

Priya: OK go on.

Robin: All right John Lennon.

Leila: Why is it so big?

Robin: What do you mean?

Leila: There's so much of it.

Robin: It's the only one I can use.

Leila: Or what? What happens?

Robin: My hair gets really frizzy, honestly.

Priya: It's because there's piss in it mate.

Robin: Yeah [laughs].

Leila: [Laughs] Yeah right OK.

Robin: Damn my children!

Leila: I think it's like really, why didn't he just confront him and

be like you are obviously stealing my milk. I would wait to

catch him.

Priya: He has confronted him several times, it does say. So you

would escalate the poisoning.

Leila: Yeah but poisoning him. I honestly think surveillance,

secret surveillance is actually less morally reprehensible

than poisoning someone.

Priya: Are you a hidden camera housemate?

Leila: [Laughs] No I'm not because no one has drunk my milk

but.

Priya: OK but you would.

Robin: I think we should get a Ring doorbell on all of your doors.

Leila: Yeah I know but fucking Ring doorbells. Right, I want to

talk about Ring doorbells for a second.

Priya: OK.

Leila: I know this is taking it...

Robin: We lose so many sponsorship opportunities because Leila

just slags off every company.

Leila: Yeah I know.

Priya: Tresemme. Milk.

Leila: Yeah milk.

Robin: Americans.

Leila: Yeah. They need sponsorship. OK we're going to talk

about how Ring doorbells are I believe the end of our

society. Does anybody have the Nextdoor App? Is that a

thing here right? Where it's like all your neighbours are on an app and I joined it as a joke, obviously.

Priya: Yeah sure OK.

Robin: So what's the app sorry? All your street joins it and what

you chat about the street?

Leila: Well so like Dawn from down the road would be like 'Oh

my God the teenagers are out again'.

Robin: Don't fight yourself Dawn.

Leila: Yeah, yeah, yeah exactly that. I like to watch people being

really whiny about everything.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: Not by myself. And the other day someone posted a

picture of their Ring doorbell and was like 'Look at that'. And it was a man delivering his parcel and I was behind [laughs]. And I think the point was that the parcel was quite misshapen and hadn't been handled very well. But I

couldn't help but really take it personally.

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: And I was like, that's. It's like have you ever Google

Earthed and then been like, oh my God there's Sue or

whatever in the whatever place.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Priya: But Google Earth is like look at all that.

Leila: Yeah that's true, yeah, yeah, yeah.

Robin: You mean Google Street View because otherwise if it's

Google Earth Sue is massive.

[Laughter]

Leila: Oh yeah. I mean I didn't want to say anything, Sue. I think

OK, I think it's quite an asshole thing to do, I'm really

sorry.

Robin: I do agree.

Leila: Although we've got a fun thing to do.

Robin: So usually at the end of each dilemma we work out who

we think is the asshole. For this lovely live version, we each have been sent to our homes a musical instrument that we are going to give to the other person, so none of us have seen what we're going to use. And if we think someone is the asshole we're going to play this musical

instrument.

Leila: As if we are adjourning a court a la Judge Rinder/ Judy.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: And any other judge in the country [laughs].

Priya: I really suggest that you think that they're the same

person.

Leila: They are.

Priya: Sure.

Robin: What would you do?

Leila: Right we're going to pass this down. How is this going to

work?

Robin: Just going down that way.

Leila: Going down the left and then Priya you give yours to me.

So we haven't seen these, we've only seen our own. OK.

Robin: Did you wrap?

Priya: Yeah I wrapped.

Robin: That's really sweet.

Leila: Have you wrapped it?

Priya: You'll realise that I'm the nerd of the group and that's my

identity.

Leila: Pass the parcel.

Robin: Guess what's in there?

[Laughter]

[Instrument played]

Robin: It sounds like a frog!

[Laughter]

Robin: Is anyone else really impressed with that?

Priya: Robin are you aware you've given me a gong and a

triangle? And I cannot play both at once.

Leila: This feels like there's some real weird racial thing going

on as well.

Priya: Classic Robin.

Leila: The other brown of the group, OK.

Robin: Well maybe one's for the audience.

Priya: Oh! Who would like a triangle? Yes!

Leila: Oh yes!

Priya: Immediately.

Leila: What's your name?

Rob: Rob.

Leila: Rob! Rob is having the triangle. Do you actually play the

triangle professionally?

Rob: Yes I've played for four years.

[Laughter]

Leila: No hang on, sorry, sorry. Are you taking the? You've

played for four years. Does it take that long to learn?

Rob: You would be surprised.

Leila: Well I would be surprised Rob!

Priya: We've got nothing to hear to.

Robin: Good fucking luck Rob.

Rob: It's OK I have four years training.

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: OK so Rob's now got out his keys.

Robin: Rob do you actually play the triangle or are you being

funny?

Leila: Give us a tune Rob.

Rob: Wait, wait. [Strikes the triangle]

Leila: Oh! OK.

Priya: That's delightful!

Robin: Did the producers send you?

Leila: Gangnam style.

Robin: Did the producers send you? I can't believe the first

applause break on the show is for Rob hitting a triangle.

Leila: Yeah fuck you all.

[Laughter]

Leila: OK I want to open mine that's been wrapped. So OK.

What?

Priya: It's a trumpet.

Leila: [Blows into the trumpet]

Priya: [Laughs] It's the saddest thing I've heard before in my life.

Leila: Yeah that is really upsetting.

Priya: Can I do my gong? Can you hold my mic?

Robin: Yes.

Leila: Yeah let's just practise the sounds.

Priya: [Strikes the gong]

Robin: That's good.

Leila: Great OK well that was fun.

Robin: Although these people didn't give it a fuckin applause

break.

Leila: Yeah I know. Yeah I know.

[Laughter]

Robin: Once you hear a triangle nothing impresses you.

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: Right, we're going to come to our conclusion. We should

all give our points and then we will do a final round

where we adjourn the court.

Priya: OK.

Leila: I'll play it properly [laughs].

Robin: We've got all these musical instruments doing fuck all on

the table!

Leila: Yeah fine OK. So my argument is that he is an asshole

because he poisoned his friend to prove a point about milk and I think it's OK to steal your flatmate's milk, sorry.

Robin: I don't think he's an asshole. I think he's a genius and

basically he thinks he's like Sherlock but with the power

to make people shit themselves. And I love that.

Leila: OK.

Priya: I would have thought he was an asshole if he hadn't had

several conversations about it. And I think look once you've had a civil conversation and no one's listened, it's

fine to poison someone.

[Laughter]

Robin: We also need the audience to decide in a sort of Red

Peppers Green Tomatoes, I don't fucking watch it...

[Laughter]

Robin: ...type way.

Leila: If you think asshole shout asshole.

Audience: Asshole.

Asshole.

Ass.

Leila: [Laughs] We're going to start a coup in Coventry.

Priya: Uh oh.

Leila: OK and who doesn't think asshole, say 'not asshole'.

Audience: [Majority of the audience] Not asshole!

[Triangle played]

Leila: Court adjourned OK.

Robin: Thank you Rob.

Priya: That was beautiful.

Robin: Thank you very much, round of applause for all of

yourselves and Rob.

Leila: Yah!

Robin: Amazing stuff.

[Applause]

[Promotion for Welcome to Spooktown]

[Here to Judge-Interim Music]

Robin: OK we're off to Mumsnet, give us a cheer if you've got a

Mumsnet account.

[Silence]

Robin: Cool

Leila: Good OK.

[Laughter]

Priya: Who does? Who does?

Robin: 'Am I being unreasonable to love looking in people's

windows!' Not a question mark, exclamation mark. 'I'm on maternity leave, my baby loves the pram (what a

surprise as older darling daughter hated it!)'.

Leila: Darling daughter.

Robin: 'And naps well in it but wakes up when I stop walking. I

also do the school run twice a day for older darling daughter. So I found myself wandering around the streets exploring parts of the neighbourhood I haven't been to before. I love looking into people's front windows, it feels

so nosy blush'.

[Laughter]

Robin: I'm reading verbatim.

Leila: Put a pin in that.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah. What they have on their walls.

Artwork, photos etcetera. How their furniture is arranged. Where their TV is positioned (and how big it

is)'.

[Laughter]

'Have all become a source of fascination to me. Has my baby brain turned to mush and I need to get out of the nearby streets more? Is it terribly bad manners? Anyone have a good nose into front windows? Disclaimer- from the street!' She's funny.

[Laughter]

'Not entering gardens and pressing my noise up against the glass! And also not stopping and gawping, always

moving along (aforementioned sleeping baby)'.

Leila: Are you a man on Mumsnet? We didn't know that all

ready, fucking hell OK.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah. So what do we think?

Priya: I think this woman has absolutely been arrested and this

is her statement that she's just posted Mumsnet to be

like, we'll see.

Robin: Do you reckon this is instead of her one phone call.

Priya: Yes [laughs] yes.

Robin: She's gone 'Can I have some WiFi please?'

Leila: [Laughs] Wait, what? Being in jail it's not like Who Want

to be a Millionaire where you get to choose what

correspondence you want.

Robin: I think that'd be great.

Leila: OK.

Robin: Instead of your one phone call you could just like...

Leila: Ask the audience.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah. Get on WiFi or yeah just have a text.

Download a Jamster ringtone or something that you

wanted.

Leila: Oh yeah that's a good point. I have loads of thoughts

about this. It feels, what I'm confused about is why it's

the baby's fault that she's doing this?

[Laughter]

Leila: Pre baby I never looked through the window, and then

suddenly. Why? Why?

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: Because the baby gives her an excuse, she's always

wanted to but the baby gives her an excuse.

Leila: Does no one else look in windows? I look in windows if

I'm on a walk.

Priya: Yeah baby or no baby.

Leila: I'll tell you what, pandemic, like one walk a day time, my

favourite thing to do was just to look in the windows and

see what everyone else was doing.

Priya: Your intense eye contact with me suggested you were

looking through my window.

Leila: [Laughs] I absolutely was yeah.

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: Yeah.

Priya: I live on the first floor.

Leila: Yeah exactly that's why the ladder is there. Is it a really

bad thing to do? It's not like a voyeur, it's not like I'm

watching people have sex, I'm just watching them watch Britain's Got Talent [laughs].

Robin: I think I'd rather people watch me have sex than

watching that.

Leila: Yeah, yeah, yeah. I like to just judge people based on

what they're watching.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: Oh when everyone did VE day then I was like watching

what they were watching on telly because I was like aww. Like what do people who? Right, does anyone here

celebrate VE day? No, good OK.

Priya: That's a no.

Leila: On my street everyone suddenly, and I'd never seen it

before, I didn't even know about it, and suddenly

everyone's doing tea parties.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: And they've got their things out the window. I was like,

right what are they? How did they hear about this event?

Robin: It felt like pandemic madness didn't it?

Priya: Oh yeah.

Robin: Fine we'll just fucking go back 100 years shall we?

Leila: Yeah, yeah, yeah, yeah.

Priya: And we'll enjoy it.

Leila: Yeah exactly yeah.

Priya: Some of us will.

Leila: Yeah weird. Do you know what? I don't think it's

particularly asshole. I just think it's like if this is the most.

This is really reminiscent of when Theresa May said the

naughtiest thing she'd ever done was run through a

wheat field.

Robin: Yeah that's true.

Leila: This is exactly that energy.

I think this woman is severely underplaying what she's Priya:

been doing.

[Laughs] Robin:

No one would post on the internet for this, she's been Priya:

> doing something much creepier but she's underplaying it because she's on Mumsnet. If this was on Reddit it would be like 'Am I the asshole for breaking into my neighbour's house and licking all their spoons?' and you'd be like

yeah. That's what she's been doing. Baby brain.

Robin: Yeah.

Leila: Baby brain.

I don't think she's being unreasonable, I think I like her Robin:

levels of enthusiasm when she's describing this. She's so

pleased with herself.

[Laughs] Priya:

She thinks she's the naughtiest bitch alive. Robin:

Sure. Priya:

[Laughter]

And in fairness she is. Priya:

Robin: Oh yeah.

Leila: 100%.

She's our special guest later. Robin:

[Laughs] Priya:

Robin: She's not coming out, she's going to watch you through

your window.

[Laughter]

Leila: I think calling it a source of fascination, the way someone

has arranged their furniture is quite indicative that perhaps you should go and like. You can have friends and

you can go into their houses.

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: You can see it like in 3D.

[Laughter]

Robin: That would be too much. Unless she turned up with the

3D glasses on.

Leila: Yeah [laughs] Yeah she goes into someone's house and

just like has a nosebleed.

Robin: She's the kind of person that would on Come Dine With

Me and go straight upstairs to their room and start going

through their drawer.

Leila: Oh my God I hate when people! That's why I could never

go on Come Dine With Me, that's the only reason.

Robin: People rooting through the drawers.

Leila: Yeah.

Priya: I would immediately...

Leila: No, no, no that's what I mean because now it sounds like

I have really weird things in my drawers. I don't.

Robin: I've just got these.

Leila: Yeah actually that was in my drawer for a spell of time.

Robin: Was it?

Leila: Yeah when it got posted to me I put it in the drawer.

Robin: In the frog drawer, obviously Robin.

Leila: The drawer which is now baron.

Priya: Lest they use the ghost frog.

Leila: Yeah exactly.

Robin: It's cute that, I really like it.

Priya: It is. It's haunted but.

Robin: Do we get to keep in?

Leila: It's been up my bum. No it hasn't, that was a joke.

Terrible joke, horrible.

[Laughter]

Robin: What did you say Leila?

Leila: I said it's been up my bum but it hasn't been up my bum.

I don't know why I said it.

[Laughter]

Leila: Now I'm saying it...

Priya: Professional comedian.

[Laughter]

Leila: Yeah. Uh OK.

Robin: I know it was a joke but now I feel weird if I touch it

[laughs].

Leila: Yeah, well it was white when it came. Uh.

[Laughter]

Priya: We're above this.

Leila: [Sniggers]

Priya: We're not.

Leila: Terrible.

Robin: I mean the edited version of the podcast is above this,

the live one clearly isn't [laughs].

Leila: No.

Robin: What do we think then?

Leila: Look I think what I'm going to say is I don't think she's an

asshole because she looks in a window.

Robin: She's an asshole because she's being unreasonable.

Leila: I think she's an asshole because, oh sorry you weren't

asking about that.

Robin: Am I being unreasonable? She's an asshole!

Leila: Yeah I don't think it's unreasonable to look into other

people's windows but I think it's unreasonable to use vernacular like, I feel so nosy blush. So that's where my

like intolerance for this human being stands.

Robin: [Laughs] Yeah because it's not like blush emoji. She's just

written the word.

Leila: She's written the word blush.

Robin: Blush. Blush.

[Laughter]

Robin: I might start doing that with emotions.

Priya: I really hope you don't.

Leila: I used to go to a hairdressers called Blush and once they

cut my ear, she didn't tell me until I got home and I

looked at my neck and it was like dripping blood.

Priya: [Draws breath shocked]

[Laughter]

Robin: That's why they call it blush.

Leila: [Laughs] Yeah, yeah, yeah. So that was fun.

Robin: We did one half live version.

Leila: No. No, no you're not going to.

Robin: [Laughs] In February and it was streamed live. And Leila,

would you call it slander or libel?

Priya: [Sings] It was slander.

Leila: It was true so it was just exposing.

Robin: Slandered a local DJ.

Leila: It was just a weird energy.

[Laughter]

Priya: If weird energy was a crime we'd all be fucked.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Leila: Yeah OK, well?

Robin: So what do you think?

Leila: I'm going to tell my verdict.

Robin: Yes please.

Leila: Can I do my verdict?

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Leila: I think, I'm going to say it, not because she looks into

windows but I think she is an unreasonable person so

[blows trumpet]. I'm running out of breath.

Robin: Yeah [laughs].

Leila: Of course they give this to the asthmatic.

Robin: Yeah [laughs]

Leila: And by the end I'll just be like do my inhaler in one hand

and then this in the other. OK continue.

Robin: I don't think she's being unreasonable. I think she needs

to have more enjoyment in her life and maybe have an

affair.

[Laughter]

Leila: [Laughs]

Robin: Hello.

Priya: That's always the advice he gives.

[Laughter]

Priya: I don't think she's being unreasonable but I think she

should admit to the crime she's definitely done. [Gong]

Robin: And audience if you think they're being unreasonable

shout 'Asshole' no, no. If you think they're being

unreasonable shout 'Unreasonable'. One, two, three.

[A few audience members shout unreasonable]

Robin: Oh good luck Tom. And if you don't think they're being

unreasonable shout 'not unreasonable'

[Many audience members shout 'not unreasonable']

[Gong]

Leila: Yah!

Priya: Yah!

Robin: Thank you very much everybody. Dah-ti-done.

[Applause]

[Here to Judge-Interim Music]

Priya: OK story three. 'Am I the' I want to say butthole.

'Buttface OK'

Robin: AITB.

Leila: AITB.

Priya: AITB.

Leila: Or is it Am I The Bitch?

Priya: Buttface.

Leila: OK.

Priya: It says buttface, I haven't just made that call myself.

Leila: Shutting me down [laughs].

Priya: Buttface.

Leila: OK fine, fine, fine, yeah.

Priya: 'Am I the buttface if I bought clothes from a charity shop

and made a profit selling them online? I didn't do this personally but my niece did and it's divided the family's opinion. My niece, 16, female, goes to a school that asks students to volunteer one afternoon a week and gives them half a day off school to do so. She decided to start helping at a charity shop sorting stock. Whilst working she saw some items for sale for £3 and bought them, knowing she could sell them online for way more. They were edgy, think like old vintage sports brands. So she made £19 by selling them on Depop. She's now decided to keep going with this all year, buying cheap items on her shift and selling them online to start her own

Priya: Yeah this is peak Alan Sugar isn't it?

Robin: Yeah this is like a millennial like a Gen Y Alan Sugar. He

wasn't selling aerials out of the back of a van he was

stealing from Scope.

Priya: Did you say selling arrows out the back of a van?

Robin: Aerials.

Priya: Aerials that makes more sense than arrows.

Leila: What's an aerial? Like the mermaid?

Robin: Like a TV...

Priya: Can you tell Leila's the youngest one? 'What's an aerial?'

[Laughter]

Robin: So TV is...

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: Not a TV aerial. I don't?

Robin: Like a TV aerial.
