Priya: Welcome to Here to Judge where we scour the internet

to dissect dilemmas and decide who's to blame. Here to

Judge today is me, Priya Hall.

Robin: Me, Robin Morgan.

Leila: And me, Leila Navabi.

Hello and welcome to this episode of Here to Judge. This episode is brought to you by the newest review on our podcast page. 'One star- Bigot Horn Live Episode. As usual I'm laughing at them not with them (what's an aerial?) This live episode and the next one is clearly not a hit with the audiences. Very painful to hear. Cringe worthy of Oscar proportions'. [Laughs hysterically] If you like the podcast, leave us a review. If you don't like the podcast leave us a review and we'll read it out loud.

Robin: Yeah we want honesty, we want honesty [laughs].

Priya: [Laughs]

Leila: That really. It was 2am and I thought, do you know what?

most?

Leila: [Laughs] Imagine Priya on Come Dine With Me.

Leila: [Laughs]

Priya: Why are you laughing? This is a completely normal

response. The whole concept of Come Dine With Me is

hell.

Robin: It's the sheer panic.

Leila: When they come and they give you flowers and they go

'Hiya' and you have to go 'Hi come in' and then you have

to bring the entertainment in.

Priya: Oh god I'd rather die.

Robin: Yeah what would your entertainment be?

Priya: I'd rather die.

Leila: What would you do?

Priya: My entertainment would be my own suicide.

Leila: [Laughs hysterically]

Robin: You'd have to be on night five I think.

Priya: Yeah [laughs] I have a real problem with that.

Robin: Otherwise the other nights would be 'Yeah it was better

than Priya's night but there hasn't been a suicide tonight'.

Priya: Entertainment on the second one would be a memorial.

Leila: This is a call out now to Derren Brown OK. I want a

special, you know where he does those specials where he tricks people into doing. They're going to take you on and you're going to think that you're on Come Dine With Me but everyone else is going to be actors and they're just going to be there to make it as horrible as possible

[laughs].

Priya: You know when they go into people's cupboards and

they put their clothes on? Genuinely throw yourself out

the window, you don't deserve to live.

Robin: Oh yeah, yeah, yeah [laughs].

Priya: You know the drones law...

Leila: [Laughs] Imagine if someone touches your cat.

Priya: Oh god don't.

Priya: You would find so many drum kits in my house because

Leila: Oh really?

Priya: You would find so many drum kits and tambourines and

cow bells. And I have no way of explaining that to

people. Like no one needs to own four cow bells.

Leila: You went Arshan's a drummer and that was like yeah

cool. Like you're explaining this secret.

Priya: I still think multiple cow bells is unreasonable.

Robin: Yeah no one is going to be like, I think she kills drummers

in bands and takes their instruments.

Leila: Yeah she's got a tambourine secret that one.

Robin: Yeah [laughs] tambourine secret.

Leila: That's the name of a band, we should make a band called

Tambourine Secret.

Robin: Tambourine Secret.

Priya: OK well I'm onboard with that.

Leila: My whole dream now is to get Priya on Come Dine With

Me. I think that's really funny.

Priya: I can't tell you how unreasonable I'd be. And then in the

taxi on the way home how unhinged I would be. I would

be crawling out the window into oncoming traffic.

Leila: [Laughs]

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: That's really funny.

Robin: Is there any other show?

Leila: Listen, I hope I'm not speaking for, like I feel like out of

everyone I know you have the most friends of everyone I

know.

Priya: Me?

Leila: You have so many friends. Yeah they're everywhere.

Priya: None of them are allowed in my house.

Leila: [Laughs]

Priya: I genuinely have friends that I've known since I was four

who haven't been in my house. Because we've moved here during the pandemic but since then I've had no will

to invite them over.

Leila: Really?

Priya: They're probably listening. I have desire to have you in

my house.

Leila: That's so funny.

Robin: Let me put this on record.

Leila: Listen we're going to come to your house now. We're

going to throw a rock. I know where you live.

Robin: [Laughs] We're going to come...

Priya: Why would you throw rocks Leila?

Leila: At your window like Troy Bolton in High School Musical.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Priya: I'm fine with you both coming into my house, I just ask

that you don't go through my things. And I think that's

reasonable.

Robin: We're going to get a ladder.

Priya: Or expect me to put on entertainment for you.

Robin: Like a '90s TV show.

Leila: Listen you're going to invite us to your house one day and

we're both going to come. We're going to arrive with flowers and like wine and whatever they do on Come Dine With Me and I'm going to open the door and be like 'Oh hi darling' I'm going to double kiss you like they always do. And then we're going to sit there and then we're going to make small talk, I'm literally just going to

pretend I've never met you so that we have...

Priya: Can I tell you a mad story about having someone around

to my house for dinner?

Leila: Always.

Robin: Yes.

Priya: I invited my mum and her ex around for dinner.

Leila: Were they together at the time?

Priya: Yes, yeah, yeah, yeah.

Leila: OK.

Priya: He came over but he heard what I was cooking, I can't

even remember what I was cooking, it was probably like risotto, something boring, and decided he didn't want to eat that so brought his own microwave chicken jalfrezi to

eat at my house.

Robin: Oh my god.

Priya: This is what happens when you invite people around for

dinner, so you don't do it.

Leila: Now that's why he's an ex.

Priya: That's why he's an ex because that is rude and insane.

Robin: That's mad.

Leila: That's really funny. That's really, I'm obsessed.

Priya: Shout out to Justin.

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: Yeah hi Justin. Come Dine With Me. That's the offer

[laughs].

Robin: Like he turns up, most people bring like a wine or

something. He's just brought like a Bird's Eye chicken

microwave.

Priya: Frozen as well. Frozen, so he picked it up fresh on his way

over.

Leila: That's horrible. That's actually disgusting.

Robin: Picked it up fresh [laughs] from like the corner shop

freezer.

Leila: That's really good. Did you enjoy your risotto though?

Was it nice?

Priya: I did. I did. We all did except for him, he sat there with his

very potent smelling chicken jalfrezi.

Robin: That's really funny.

Leila: Is that like a Kiev? Remind me what's jalfrezi?

Priya: It's a curry.

Leila: Oh why did I think it was a? Oh OK.

Robin: Microwave meals are so aggressively loud when you have

to pierce them. So when you were like entertaining he was probably in the kitchen going, pop, pop, pop, pop,

pop, pop!

Priya: I had to do the pops Robin. I had to cook his microwave

meal.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: So I was passive aggressively stabbing this man's dinner

while cooking an actual dinner.

Robin: Stirring with one hand, popping with the other.

Leila: This is a safe space, if you pissed in it you can tell us now.

Robin: It's like rub your belly and touch your head.

Priya: What?

Leila: You pissed in it. Did you piss in it?

Priya: No I didn't piss in it! No.

Leila: You pissed in his jalfrezi. You did.

Priya: I didn't piss in the man's jalfrezi.

Leila: You can admit it here.

Priya: Look if it wasn't an open plan flat where he definitely

would have seen me pissing in the jalfrezi, I might have pissed in the jalfrezi. But there's no getting around it, he would have seen me. So I had to serve this man his

jalfrezi.

Robin: I think that's what the film lid is for in those dishes, to

stop piss.

can't even fucking spit in a jalfrezi anymore.

Robin: Can't even spit in a jalfrezi anymore. This current

generation, they don't spit in jalfrezis anymore [laughs].

Leila: [Laughs] OK.

Priya: To answer your question from earlier Robin, Four in a

Bed can also get the fuck away from me.

Robin: [Laughs]

Leila: Is that the hotel one?

Priya: Yeah it's so rude. It's so rude.

Leila: It's so rude [laughs]. I'm obsessed, this is really good, we

should tap into this more as the podcast continues.

Robin: We send Priya on a different reality show every single

week.

Priya: Four in a Bed, I would have to own a B&B before I would

qualify to do it, so in this scenario.

Robin: I would happily get a mortgage on that place.

Leila: My whole evening is now going to be spent signing Priya

up for various reality TV shows. Just like, and then I will pretend to be. Because let's be honest, they're not going to check are they? And then we'll get to like the final stage. I'm going to get through to the final stage and then I'm going to be like 'Priya we're going on a nice time out' and then you're going to turn up and then we'll just be like 'You're auditioning for Britain's Got Talent' or

Priya: Wearing like the most clothes possible.

Leila: No like fully all of them.

Robin: Yeah like a ghostly gown.

Leila: A ghostly gown on Love Island [laughs]. No ditto with

Naked Attraction, they'll like lift the thing up and it will just be like a petty coat and it will be like, why has she

got a doily on?

Priya: I own so many petty coats.

Robin: Like a 19th century Naked Attraction, just showing an

ankle and that's it.

Leila: And they'd lift it up and it would be like 'Wow where's

her feet?' and they're like 'Oh she's hovering. Oh she's a

ghost'.

Robin: [Laughs] [Claps]

Leila: She's really a ghost, she hasn't got feet, she just hovers.

Robin: 'What do you think of the green one?' 'Oh I quite like a

ghost actually'.

Leila: I've always wanted to fuck a ghost. Right back to laundry.

Priya: I think I'd be more likely to do Naked Attraction than

fine.

Leila: Yeah I would do your dishes.

Priya: Washing clothes is weird.

Leila: Do you want me to come and do your dishes?

Priya: You can't come in and do my dishes.

Leila: Why not?

Priya: I'm putting you on a lifetime ban from doing my dishes.

Leila: Let me in!

Priya: I didn't think I'd need to do that but consider that set in

stone.

Robin: [Laughs] Leila's shouting through the letterbox 'Let me do

the dishes!'

Leila: Let me in! [Laughs] Just sticking my tongue through the

letterbox.

Priya: I know you've got some dishes in there!

Leila: Just put the plate through the letterbox.

Robin: Shoving your little IKEA brush through it.

Leila: Oh yum jalfrezi, nice.

Robin: Is that piss and jalfrezi?

Priya: Yum, yum, yum. I think you'll find it's shit in the jalfrezi.

Robin: Shit in the jalfrezi [laughs].

Leila: Additional spit jalfrezi. This episode is a mess.

Robin: Oh god.

Leila: This episode is such a mess [laughs].

Priya: Unhinged.

Robin: It's fucking, it is mad.

Leila: This is unhinged. This is what happens when you give

three people criticism that have no self-esteem.

Robin: [Laughs]

Priya: [Laughs]

Priya: 'Am I the asshole for wanting to walk into my first home

helped me out quite a bit too financially.'

Leila: Yeah no shit.

Robin: [Laughs]'My wife has not been employed very

consistently. She has worked as a model, but hasn't saved much at all. I bought the house, and the estate agent handed over the keys to me. My wife wasn't there at the handover. I was obviously super excited to show her the house and for us to start our lives together. We

drove up to the house yesterday. I said to her while we sat in the car outside 'Is it OK if I go alone first, just so I can have a moment alone in my first home?' I felt that it was a significant moment in my life and I wanted to experience it alone, even just for 30 seconds. My wife was upset about this and has been off with me ever since. We have moved some of our stuff in but she's clearly pissed. I think she's being selfish. My brother says I am being ridiculous. Am I the asshole?'

Leila: This is crazy.

Robin: Yes.

Priya: 100% yes.

Leila: This is insane.

Robin: He thinks his life is like a sitcom. Or like the final scene in

Friends where...

Leila: Yeah that's exactly, with the keys!

Robin: [Laughs] Yeah.

Leila: Yeah.

Priya: He also hates and disrespects his wife and doesn't think

modelling is a real career.

Robin: Mm.

Priya: And has no respect for her as a person.

Robin: Yeah. She hasn't saved much at all.

Priya: I've bought a house.

Robin: And neither have I because my parents have helped me

out hugely.

Leila: Yeah I bought, you didn't buy a house.

Priya: Your parents bought you a house, bought you and your

wife a house.

Leila: Yeah if anything your parents should be the ones walking

in there and having a like moment in their life sort of

vibe.

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah. Can you believe we've wasted

this on our piece of shit son?

Leila: Yeah what the hell.

Priya: And he's in like a highchair on the back of the car, on like

a booster seat. Stay here a minute we just want to have a

moment alone in our new house.

Robin: Imagine being married like six months, like proper

honeymoon period.

Priya: Yeah.

Robin: And going through one of the biggest stages, like you've

got married, you've just bought your first home together and you go 'Can you just stay in the car like a fucking dog

please? Is that all right?'

Leila: No. I really hate this.

Priya: This is my house.

Robin: So gross. So gross.

Priya: Also like just a blatant misunderstanding of how marriage

works no? That he thinks that he's bought a house. What

she just lives in his house does she?

Robin: Yeah, yeah, yeah. My first home.

Leila: And also like what sort of home is that going to create for

her if she's like I don't feel like I live here like?

Priya: Also he says 'I can't wait to show her the house' which

suggests she's not even seen the house that he's bought.

Robin: [Draws breath shocked] That's so true.

Priya: And that's so fucked up.

Robin: That's so true! Fuck!

Priya: He's bought a house without consulting her whatsoever.

Leila: Simultaneously, I'm going to say something else now that

might be controversh, just to play devil's advocate.

Priya: Go on.

Robin: OK.

Leila: If my partner had been bought a house and was just like

'Come live in it but can I have 30 seconds?' I'd be like 'Yeah enjoy' as long as I'm not having to contribute to

anything [laughs] Enjoy your 30 seconds.

Robin: Sure.

Priya: I suppose. But I think that would be like a mutual thing

though. It would be like during the process she would have been bought a house as opposed to, clearly his wife

was not aware that he only viewed this house...

Leila: Yeah this is all crazy, I mean yeah. I'm just trying to think

if I would care, and I don't know if I would.

Priya: Yeah.

Leila: I'd be like 'Yeah have your 30 seconds, do what you like,

you're weird but fine'.

Robin: Because I'm going to ruin it for the rest of the time we're

here.

Priya: Yeah I'm going to make your life a misery.

Leila: Yeah. I don't know but I still think this is weird behaviour.

Like absolutely.

Priya:

It's not even just feeling the house as his own and not hers. It's being so openly disrespectful of her that he's willing to say to her face 'Stay in the car, I'm going to go and enjoy my new home, you stay in the car'. It's that disrespect.

Leila:

Yeah it's that, it's the way he's done it. It's not even the way he's like, I'm not defending this because I think it's weird. But some people have their weird little things don't they? That they just like to do.

Priya: Yeah.

Robin: Yeah.

Priya: He had the keys before her though. Like he had the keys,

he picked up the keys without her, he could have just

gone...

Robin: That's so true.

Priya: ...and had that moment if that was so important to him.

He made the effort to go and get her.

Leila: If this was like a film, this is the film plot. He'd say 'Stay in

the car you wench' and he goes to the door and he opens the door and he walks in and he's like 'ah.' And then the ceiling collapses on him and he dies and then he's a

ghost.

Priya: Beautiful.

Leila: And then he has to like right all of his wrongs and she has

to move into the house and like rebuild it with another man and she falls in love with the builder and then he's

like 'Now I can leave' and that's the end of the film.

Priya: I like that but in my mind where the ceiling comes down

is actually her driving his car into the bay window of their

new house.

Leila: Yeah [Laughs] yeah, yeah.
